FROSTY LEMON CRUNCH
(serves 6 to 8)

Crust
2 tablespoons butter
1/2 cup finely crushed corn flakes
3 tablespoons brown or white sugar
1/2 cup chopped nuts

Filling
1 egg, separated
1/2 cup sugar
1/2 cup lemon juice
1 tablespoon grated lemon rind
1/2 cup (small cans) undrained Carnation Evaporated Milk, chilled and whipped

Melt butter over low heat. Add corn flakes, sugar and nuts. Cook until sugar melts and caramelizes slightly. Cool.

Mix egg yolk and sugar. Beat egg whites stiff and fold into yolk mixture. Add lemon juice and lemon rind. Fold in whipped Carnation. Pour into refrigerator tray. Sprinkle top with crushed nuts. Freeze until firm. Serve cold.

*To chill Carnation for whipping, freeze in refrigerator tray until ice crystals form around edges.

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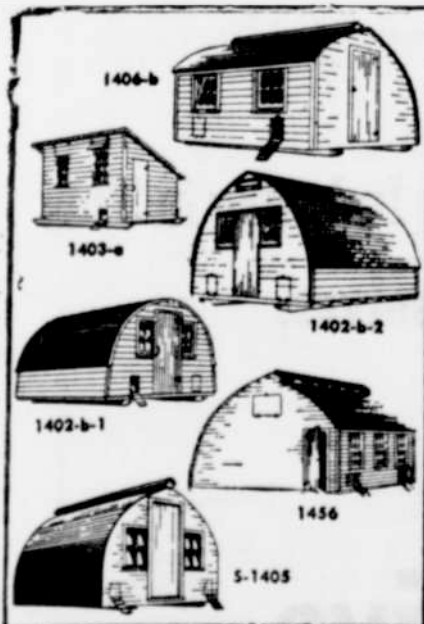
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
