**John Day**—Grant county's first polio victim of the year is 68-year old Mrs. Bessie Johns of Prairie City.

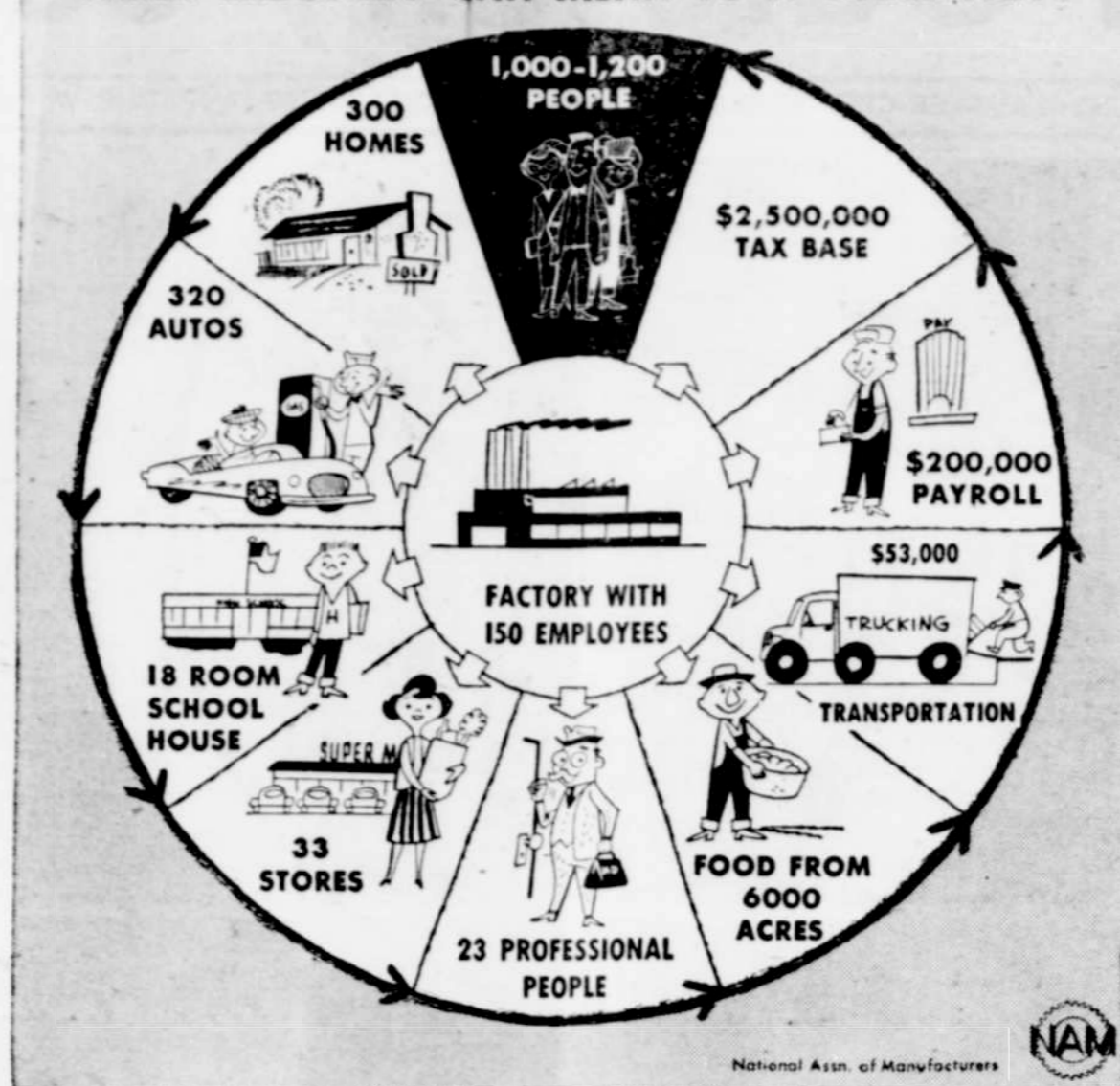
Mrs. Johns case was diagnosed as polio by Dr. A. R. Kincaid, county health officer, and she was sent to the polio center in Nyssa on Friday. Tests there verified the diagnosis, and she will receive treatment at that place.

Dr. Kincaid announced that gamma Globulin shots will be given anyone who has had direct contact with the patient and is under 35 years old. The serum is under the control of the Office of Defense Mobilization. Shots can be given by any family physician, who may charge a fee for his services, but not for the serum, which is distributed free.—Blue Mt. Eagle.

**Baker**—Valuation for tax purposes in Baker county has dropped to the lowest point in five years, it was indicated today upon report of assessment roll summaries by Assessor Unnar Steven to the state tax commission.

Valuation of real and personal property in the county was placed at \$17,878,005, exclusive of utilities, compared with \$19,027,625 a year earlier.

The decline amounted to a net drop of \$1,166,870, Mr. Stevens' figures indicated.

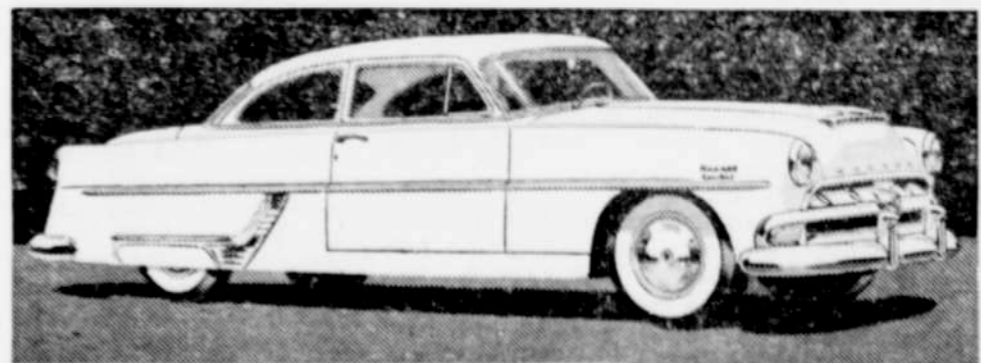
