Bride's Party Food



Be it shower, afternoon tea or the bride's reception, gay sandwiches, canapés, and tidbits, served with party punch, are choice refreshments. You can't beat canned juices for convenient punch-making. Get the 46-oz. cans (approx. 5 1/2 cups), chili, and mix as needed. Add tea, ginger ale or soda water, or use a mixture of full strength juices. To make especially festive add spoons of sherbet to float on the punch in the bowl. Here are suggestions for some extra good party snacks.

Cheese Nips

1/2 cup cottage cheese
1/2 cup grated sharp cheese
1 tablespoon mayonnaise
1 tablespoon prepared horseradish
1/4 teaspoon seasoned salt
1 4-oz. can Vienna sausage

Mix all ingredients except sausage. Spread on crackers or small toast strips. Cut Vienna sausage in 1/2-inch slices and top each canapé with a slice. About 24 canapés.

Deviled Ham Rolls

2 small cans deviled ham
2 tablespoons chopped peanuts
2 tablespoons mayonnaise
1 tablespoon grated onion

Mix all ingredients. Spread thin slices of bread (2 x 4 inches) with mixture. Roll. Fasten with toothpicks; chill. When ready to serve, put parsley or watercress in each end. Remove toothpicks. About 12 rolls.

Open Party Sandwiches

1/2 cup mayonnaise
1 tablespoon prepared mustard
1 tablespoon grated onion

Mix all ingredients, and chill. Pile mixture on toast cricettes, triangles, or squares. Decorate with ripe olive slices, pimiento, capers, or parsley. About 24 sandwiches.

Bulletin Outlines
Open Hen Housing

Open type housing for poultry gives good results in western and southwestern Oregon where winters are mild, but its use east of the Cascades is questionable says a bulletin recently released by the Oregon State college agricultural experiment station.

The publication, "Open Houses and Cages for Laying Hens," explains that layers in open houses will decline in egg production when exposed to several days or longer of below-freezing temperatures. This type housing is satisfactory, however, in areas having mild winters. It is simple and inexpensive to construct and has operational advantages.
