Lonnie Anderson who has been

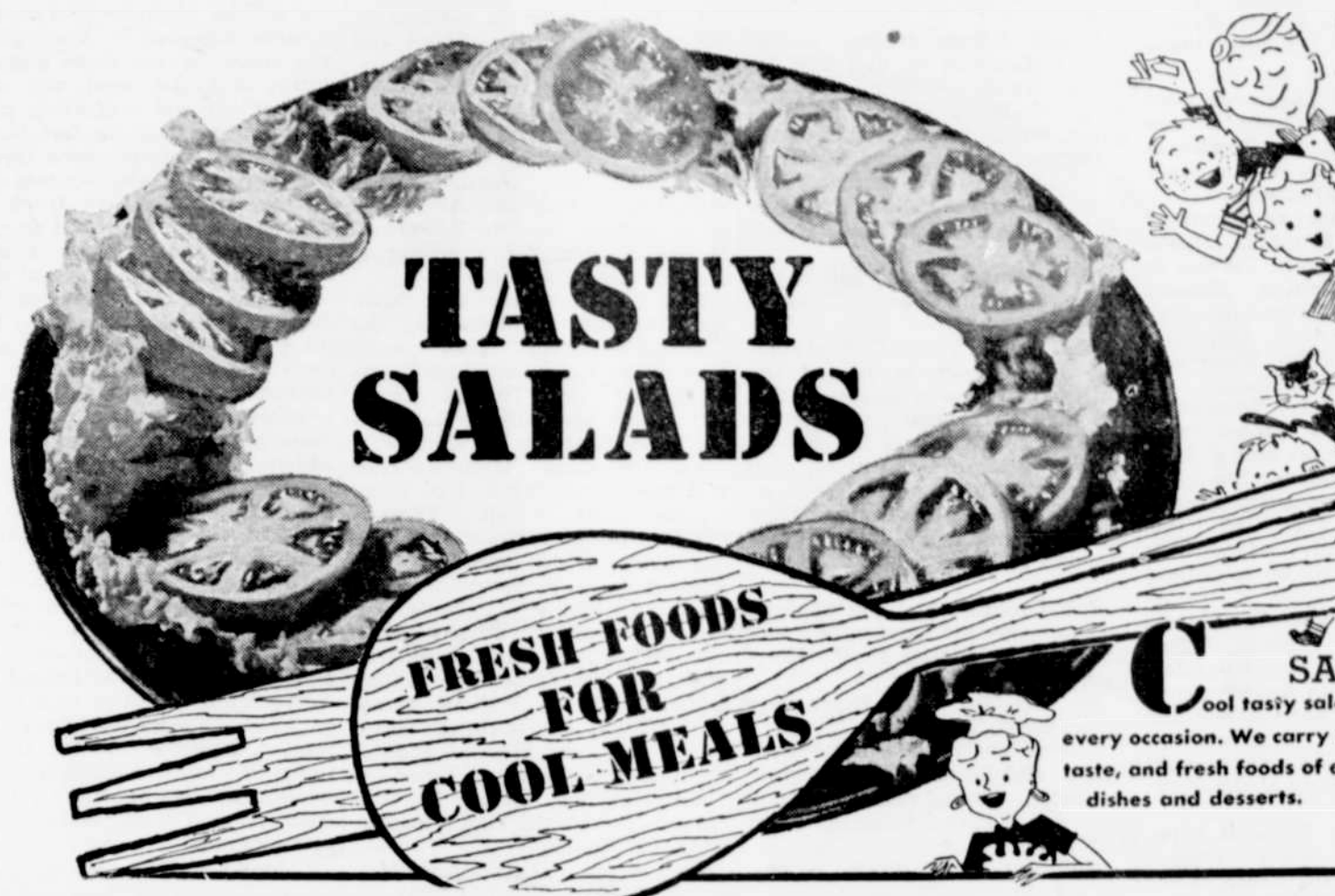
stationed with the Air Force at Cheyenne, Wyo., visited a few days with Mr. and Mrs. W. G. Booth. He expects to go overseas in a few days.

Suggests These Timely Salad Ideas

COLE SLAW: Shred chilled cabbage. Combine 1 cup prepared mayonnaise or salad dressing, ¼ cup undiluted Carnation Evaporated Milk and 1 teaspoon prepared mustard. Mix well into shredded cabbage. Season with salt and pepper.
