Same Sprayer for Weeds and Insects May Bring Grief

Your neighbor's farm or garden may have suffered no damage when he washed out his weed sprayer before using it to spray plants with insecticide. You try it, and your healthy tomato plants curl up and die.

Flex Warren, Oregon State college farm crops specialist, says much confusion has arisen over use of equipment for the dual job of controlling weeds and insects. It all depends on the type of weed killer previously used, the crops to be sprayed, and the method of cleaning equipment.

If the weed killer was a phenoxycetic compound—2,4-D, 2,4,5-T and MCP—you might be headed for trouble. Most fruits, vegetables and legumes are injured in varying degrees by this family of chemicals. Beans, tomatoes, some vegetables, grapes and tree fruits are highly susceptible. It is best to use a separate sprayer for them since no method of cleaning can be guaranteed to remove all traces of the weed killer.

For less susceptible plants such as corn and legume crops, however, the spraying equipment can safely be used again after it is thoroughly cleaned by one of several recommended methods.

To remove 2,4-D, 2,4,5-T or MCP, all pieces of the spraying equipment—tank, pump, spray boom—should be soaked for 24 hours in a one percent solution of household ammonia (2 teaspoonfuls per quart of water) and then rinsed several times with clear water. Or you can follow the same procedure, using household lye, one pound to 100 gallons of water.

Another method is to wash the equipment thoroughly with a one percent suspension of activated charcoal and then rinse with clear water. Wooden spray tanks cannot be cleaned with any of these materials since the weed-killing acid is absorbed by the wood.

If the weed killer used was a chemical other than one of phenoxycetic acid compounds such as 2,4-D, the spraying equipment may be re-used safely after being washed thoroughly with water and a small amount of detergent.
