OLD FASHIONED SUGAR WAFERS

Perfect to have on hand for summer entertaining.

1/4 cup shortening
1/4 cup butter or margarine
1 cup White Satin Beet Sugar
2 eggs
2 teaspoons vanilla extract
3 cups sifted all-purpose flour
1 teaspoon salt
1 teaspoon baking powder.

In mixing bowl cream shortening, sugar. Stir in each egg thoroughly; then flavoring. Gradually fold in sifted dry ingredients. Work with about half the dough, keeping the remainder chilled.

Roll dough out on a board (lightly dusted with mixture of 1 cup flour and 1/2 cup sugar) to 1/8 in. thickness. Cut in desired shapes. Bake on an ungreased cookie sheet in a hot oven (400F) for about 7 min. Cool on cake rack. Makes about 7 1/2 dozen of 2-inch delicious sugar wafers.

WHITE SATIN FROSTING

Perfect double boiler frosting; frosts generously 8 or 9-in. (2-layer) cake.

1 1/2 cups White Satin Beet Sugar
1/3 cup water
2 egg whites, room temp.
1 teaspoon lemon juice
1/8 teaspoon salt
1 1/4 teaspoons vanilla extract.

In top section of double boiler place sugar, water, egg whites, dry or electric beater for 1 min.; stir around sides and bottom with rubber scraper.

Place over boiling water and continue beating until frosting stiffens and holds its shape, about 7 minutes.

Remove from heat; continue beating until frosting is slightly cool, about 2 min. Add vanilla.

(Use fresh, canned or frozen lemon juice. Or, substitute for the lemon juice 1/8 teaspoon cream of tartar).
