Mrs. Dorothy Bibbey was hostess to members of group two. The afternoon was spent mending and pressing clothing for the migrant workers.

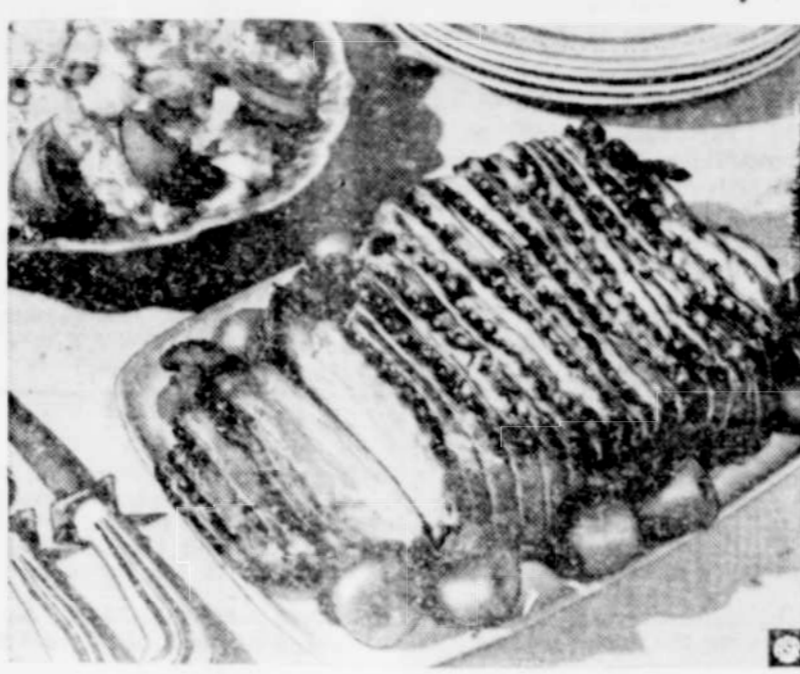

Ham-From-A-Can Fares Beautifully



Boned, cooked and ready-to-serve hams in cans are a joy to serve. Here the ham is baked with special fruit syrup and garnished with canned peaches also simmered in the same gingert glaze mixture.

The hams requiring refrigeration storage are generally canned in 6 to 12-pound sizes. The 6 1/2-pound ham is now one of the most popular sizes with consumers. Some members of the meat canning industry are also bringing out a 4-pound canned ham because consumers have indicated interest in the smaller units.

A neat serving trick when the ham is to be served at a buffet calls for slicing the ham before heating it. Stud every other slice with cloves prior to cutting and then tie the ham back into its original shape and bake. By figuring three to four servings per pound, you have a basis for judging the size ham to buy.

Glazed Canned Ham

6 to 12-pound canned ham 1 tablespoon cornstarch
Whole cloves 2 tablespoons vinegar
1 No. 2 1/2 can cling peach halves 3 tablespoons prepared mustard
1/2 cup unsifted molasses

For attractive service and easy carving, slice ham before heating. Cut 1/4-inch slice; insert cloves along top edge of ham slice. Leave second slice plain. Stud every other slice with cloves before it is cut. Tie sliced ham with string in original shape; place in shallow baking pan. Drain peaches; measure liquid; reserve. (There should be about 1 1/2 cups.) Mix cornstarch and vinegar to a paste in saucepan. Blend in mustard, drained peach syrup and molasses. Bring to a boil, stirring constantly. Use to baste ham two or three times during baking. Bake in a moderate oven (350° F.) 1 hour. Stud peach halves with cloves, add to remaining syrup; heat. Use to garnish ham; trim with mint leaves if desired. Serve with potato salad. YIELD: 3 to 4 servings per pound.
