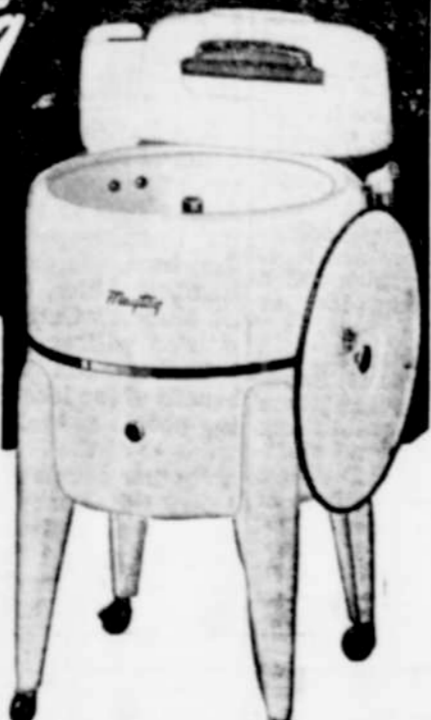

Episcopal Church News

The Town and Country Institute, a department of the national headquarters in New York City, sent Lindsay Warren to the Rev. Carl H. Gross for training in the rural field as general assistant. Mr. Warren will be here until August 19, when he will return to the Town and Country Institute for evaluation of his work and then, to the Protestant Episcopal Seminary, Bexley Hall, at Gambier, Ohio, for his third and last year of seminary studies.

During previous summers Mr. Warren has worked in the field of institutional chaplaincy. He came down to Nyssa from the Protestant Episcopal camp for Eastern Oregon at Cove, where he conducted classes in art and dramatics.

Mr. Warren's home is at Umatilla. After having graduated from Reed College, Portland, he took up his studies at Bexley Hall. Upon completion of his three year's seminary course, he will work in the district of Eastern Oregon under Bishop Lane W. Barton.

The Rev. Carl H. Gross is giving a series of Sunday sermons on the characteristics of the Protestant Episcopal church and her contribution to the Church of Christ as exemplified in the National Council of Churches of Christ in the USA and in the World Council of Churches. These sermons will lead up to a special service on Aug. 8 for the success of the Assembly of the World Council of Churches at Evanston, Ill. (Aug. 14-31) where 1500 delegates and observers from 161 protestant communions and 48 countries will meet.

Next Sunday, Lindsay Warren, who is assisting at St. Paul's this summer, will preach on "The Episcopal Ministry."

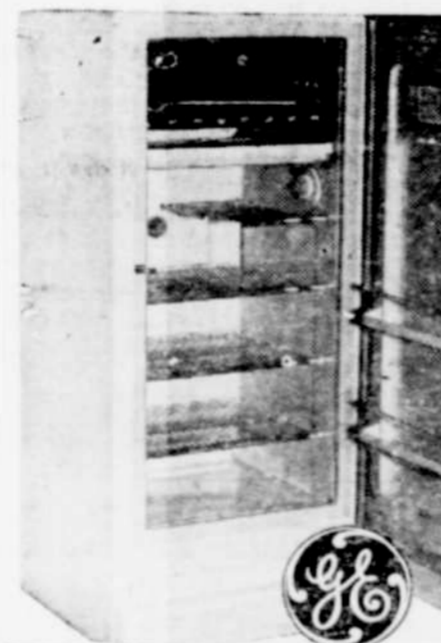

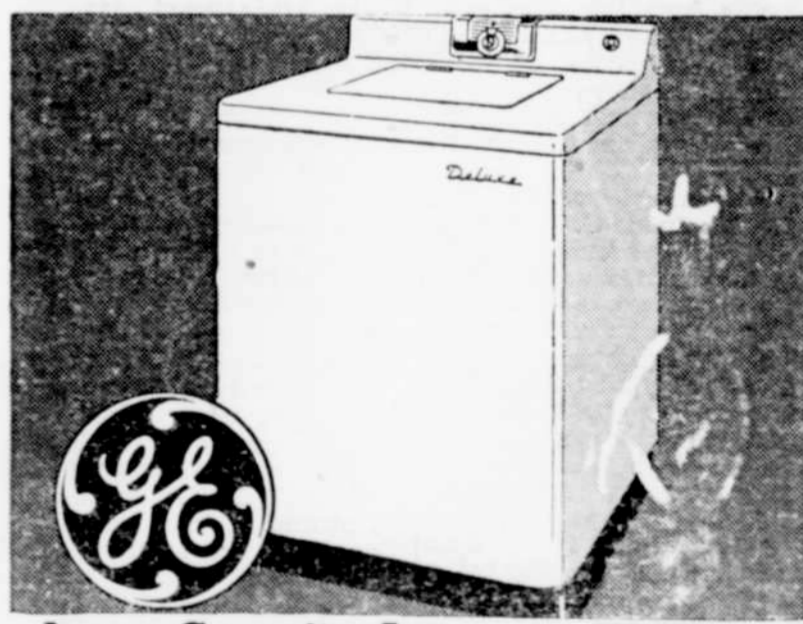

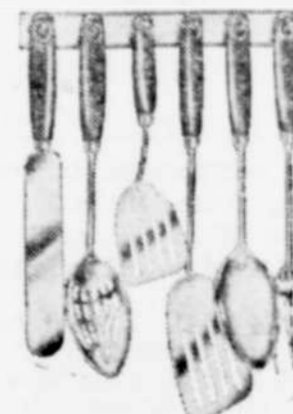
