

Annual Spraying Program By City Underway Friday

The city of Nyssa started spraying all vegetation throughout town last Friday to combat insects, especially flies and mosquitoes. The spray crew started on the east side of town and will require about three weeks to cover all the property, City Manager Robert M. Applegate said.

Trees, grass and shrubbery on city property and at all homes will be covered, however, homeowners are notified that in some instances the crews cannot do the job as thoroughly as can commercial sprayers. Since efforts are being made to cover the entire town in a minimum length of time, tops of tall trees cannot always be reached. Assistance from residents having shrubbery difficult to reach is being asked.

The spray is non-toxic unless inhaled at close range, but homeowners will be notified wherever possible before the crew arrives so that doors and windows of homes can be closed if they desire.

The annual program has been effective in controlling insects in past years and all expense is borne by the city.

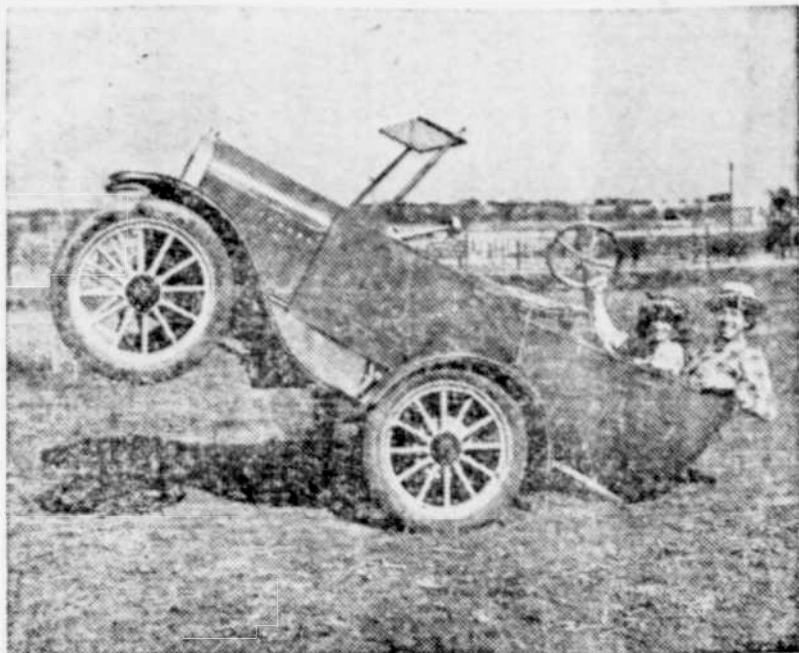

A 1:20 alarm Wednesday afternoon called Nyssa firemen to the labor camp where a grass and weed fire had got out of control near the west fence of the camp. Flames were quickly put out by the volunteers.

Tom Weeks, water superintendent, stated that he made a hurried survey of the town after the alarm sounded and discovered that only a few homeowners had turned off their irrigation water. He called attention to the city's new policy which allows residents to irrigate when they wish, but requires all hoses and sprinklers to be turned off as soon as the fire siren is sounded.

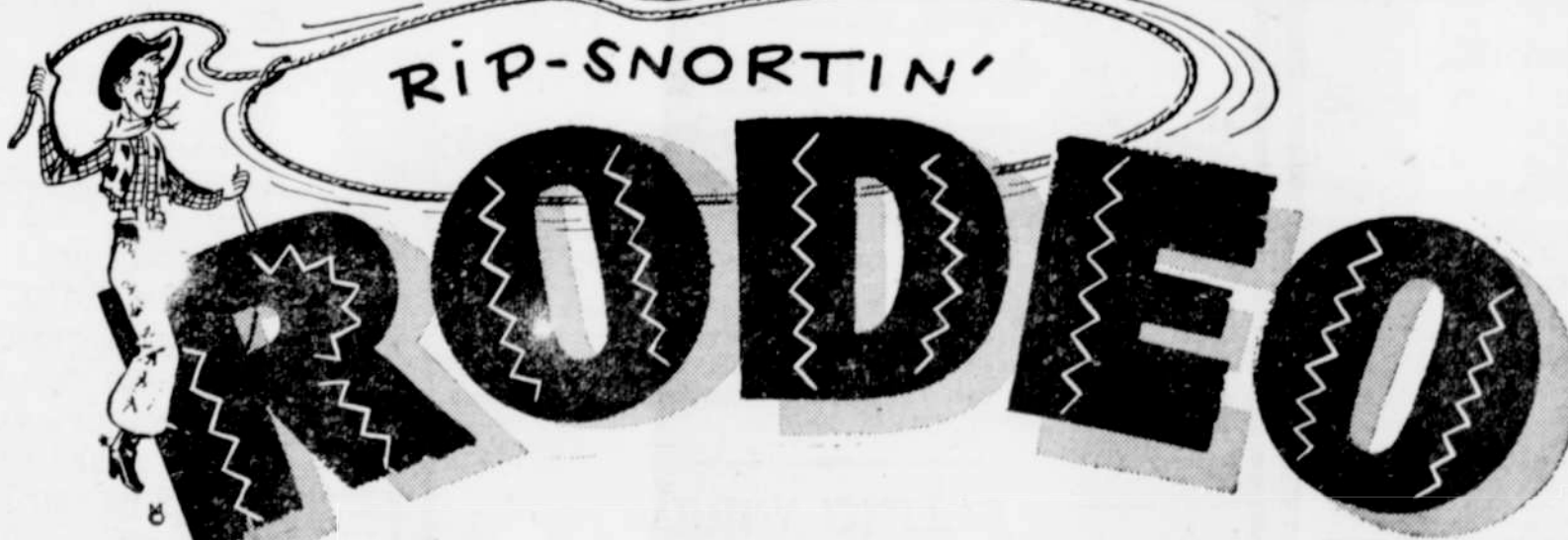
