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County Agent Reports Drought In Colorado Area

Malheur County Agent Harry Sandquist, who is attending a three-week summer school at the Colorado A & M in Fort Collins, Colo., reports that area is experiencing one of the most serious droughts in its history.

In a letter to the Journal this week, the county agent stated: The range country is dried and very little feed is available. Irrigation water is critically short and what should be a beautiful country shows extreme signs of this shortage. Many of the crops on irrigated land are burning for lack of water—thousands of acres of irrigated crops have been abandoned and many of the fields appear to be beyond saving. Farmers are concentrating the water that is available on a relatively small part of their crop land. While I realize that this is normally a good country, seeing it now makes me thankful that I will be back in Malheur county in a few days.

One of the courses that Sandquist is taking is an agricultural policy course taught by Dr. Tyrus Timm, head of the department of agricultural economics at Texas A & M. Timm has a national reputation in this field. He has the ability to make this somewhat complex subject understandable and it's the kind of a course that can be enjoyed very much, the county agent reported.

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County Dairy Herds Continue High Production Records For Dairy Month

A summary of the Malheur Dairy Herd Improvement association records for the June testing program showed that 35 of the 46 herds enrolled in the testing program made monthly records averaging more than 30 pounds of butterfat per cow, according to a report released by Harry Sandquist, Malheur county agent.

The Jersey herd owned by L. Bland Vaughn of Vale led the list with an average production of 48.3 pounds of fat per cow.

Three Jersey cows owned by Chester Clark of Ontario completed individual yearly records that were entered on the standard honor roll as defined by the United States Bureau of Dairy Industry. One of these cows, a four-year old registered Jersey, completed a 305 day record producing 13,409 pounds of milk and 631 pounds of fat. Two records of more than 400 pounds of fat were made by two-year old cows completing their 305 day milking period. A two-year old Holstein owned by Wayne Piercy of Nyssa, was also entered on the honor roll by completing a yearly record of 10,381 pounds of milk containing 414.6 pounds of butterfat.

The monthly report shows that nine herds made production records between 40 and 45 pounds of

fat for the month. These herds were owned by: Robert Thompson, Jack Taylor, Archie Kardell and Nolen Field of Vale; Guy Moore, Toomb & Phifer, Howard Bair and Roland Maw of Nyssa and Gilbert Sproul of Ontario.

The dairy herds with monthly records between 35 and 40 pounds of fat were owned by Ed Moore, Ray Kinion, J. Irvin Hart, Lewis John and J. V. Skinner, all of Vale; Paul Cleaver, Al Thompson & Son and Leroy Herrman of Nyssa; H. Collier & Son, S. R. Nelson, George Ward and L. J. Wettstein of Ontario.

Thirteen herds made production records between 30 and 35 pounds of fat. These herds were owned by Edwin O. Johnson, Fred Patterson, Dale Haws, Joe Payne and G. C. Zigler of Vale; Glenn Peterson, Dee J. Garner, Elver Nielsen, W. E. Piercy and James Peterson of Nyssa; Chester Clark, S. M. Nelson and the Kercrest Farms of Ontario.

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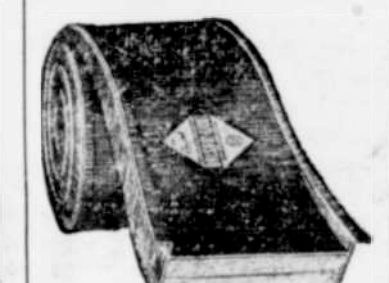
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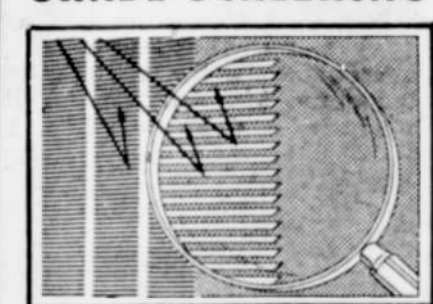
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
