Your Library

Novels and non-fiction on such subjects as the flight of the Cheyenne Indians, other countries, penology, and war, will be the books going into circulation on Saturday, July 24, at the Malheur County Library.

The Conquest of Don Pedro, by Harvey Fergusson begins just after the Civil War and tells how, when Leo Mendes decides to start a permanent trading post in the New Mexican village of Don Pedro, he runs headlong into conflict with Don Agustin Vierra.

Cheyenne Autumn, by Mari Sandoz' new book which describes the march of the Cheyennes from the Indian Territory in Oklahoma toward their homeland in Montana in 1878, with its tragic consequences.

Santha Rama Rau writes a reportorial guide to her country in This Is India, with comment on festivals, hospitality, personal adornment and other topics she considers representative of Indian life.

In Diary of a Self-Made Convict, Alfred Hassler who served a term in a federal penitentiary as a conscientious objector, the author tells how prison life affects sensitive, perceptive, educated men, and debunks the illusion that life is a well-administered prison can be quite passable.

The second series of selected stories from the magazine comes out again under the title The Best for Fantasy and Science Fiction.

Dan'l Boone Kissed Me, by Felix Holt is a story of the Kentucky country in the 1840's centering around Pappy Duke and his family, and deriving its name from a memory of Granny's when she was a girl.

The Survivors, is Ronald McKie's account of the "Perth" and the U. S. S. "Houston" in the Battle of Sunda Strait. The events told in the book were unknown until after the war.

Michael Gilbert's novel Fear to Tread, is the story of one man's battle against organized crime in black market food deals.

The autobiography of the Jones twins, cameramen and correspondents, has been given the title Double Trouble.

"World Without End" is Emil Lengyel's description of the Middle East, the background of its people, and its present cultures.

Shakespeare, by Max Reese gives a fairly full and uncomplicated account of his life, work and age.

Samuel Sharp reviews the centuries of Polish history and analyzes the problem of Polish independence in strictly political terms in his book Poland, White Eagle on a Red Field.

Mrs. Ora Newgen and Patricia Rice had dinner Saturday with Mrs. Eva Wohlcke in Parma.

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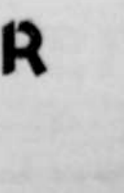
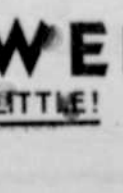
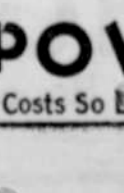
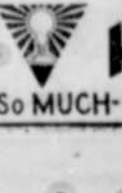
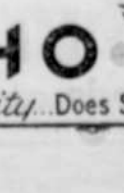
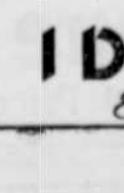
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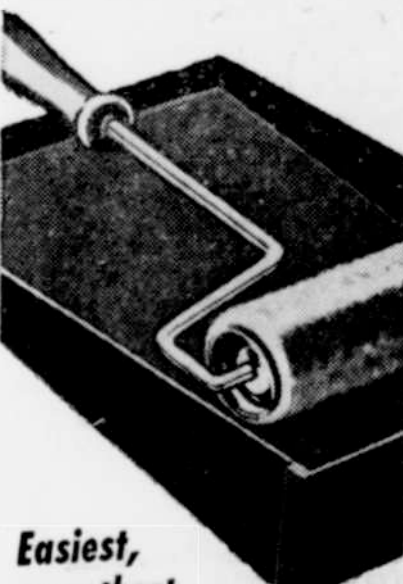
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
