Days Gone By in Nyssa Community

From the Journal Files

10 Years Ago—August 3, 1944

Lloyd Lewis, appointed as acting postmaster in the Nyssa post-office, assumed his new duties Aug. 1. He succeeds S. D. Goshert who is retiring from government service. The new postmaster has been employed as carrier on route 2 for the past 5 years. — About 20 men attended the second meeting of the newly organized Adrian Commercial club. Officers elected were: Mr. Dierking, president; Vernon Parker, vice president and Clyde Steelman, secretary-treasurer. — Produce companies buying from local residents are shipping an average of 15 carloads, a day from the Nyssa Adrian section. — The city of Nyssa has received priority from the war production board for the purchase of a fire truck. — The Thompson Oil company has completed construction of an addition to its service station at Third and Main. — Mr. and Mrs. Dwight O. Wyckoff were married at the Methodist church in Nyssa. The bride is the former Miss June Marie Wilson.

15 Years Ago—August 3, 1939

L. T. Marshall announced that his new venture, the Polar Cold Storage and Locker Plant was open for business. The plant represents an investment of \$12,000 and is the only modern plant of its kind between Salt Lake City and Portland. — Nyssa leads in the number of carloads of potatoes shipped out. During July 104 carloads were shipped out. — Malheur county leads the state in a recent survey of farm stock. — The Board of Directors of the Nyssa Union high school met Saturday and accepted as substantially complete the \$73,000 high school building from Ritchie & son, contractors. — The Idaho Power company has a crew surveying the Cow Hollow vicinity for a power line. — The largest stud of the week was shown by Bunny Schweizer whose tuber topped the scales at 3 pounds 5 ounces.

20 Years Ago—August 2, 1934

Mrs. Raymond T. Davis was startled when a rattlesnake struck at her without warning while she was walking in her garden. Mr. Davis killed the snake and saved its ten rattles. — A sprinkle of rain brought some relief from the heat wave which has continued over several weeks. Several men were overcome with heat at the Terteling camp while doing construction work on the Owyhee. — A fierce dust storm visited the Arcadia area, picking up new stacks of hay scattering them broadcast over the fields with the result that many ranches had to re-shock and re-stack their hay. — Dr. Bartlett came over from Ontario to take a boat ride with Henry McNee to his rabbit island in the Snake river. Dr. Bartlett is certain the river offers recreational advantages that few appreciate. — Mr. Huemaker and son arrived from Nebraska to take possession of the ranch they purchased from John Nichols.

25 Years Ago—August 2, 1929

A permanent organization was formed for promoting the interests of the proposed Nyssa-Winnemucca railroad. E. M. Blodgett of Nyssa was elected president. W. T. Lockwood of Boise secretary and Joel Priest of the Oregon Short Line of Boise, vice president. — George Hill, owner of the famous Idanha orchard, has purchased the entire Holstein dairy herd of Mr. Applegate of New Plymouth. — The secretary of state has placed a registration office in Nyssa for foreign cars, with Don M. Graham as registrar. — Chas. Crawford has purchased a new Ford truck for the purpose of hauling school

children this fall. — George Brinson is building Artie Robertson a 5-room completely modern bungalow. It is located northeast of the ball park. — Harold Long was brought to the hospital in Nyssa suffering from poisoning which he received while swimming in the Shoestring canal.

30 Years Ago—August 1, 1924

C. H. Oxnam of Jamieson lost a \$500 stack of hay by fire caused by spontaneous combustion. — L. Eachus of Adrian reports 97.5 bushels of Federation wheat to the acre. — The service garage has been sold to George P. Ward. — C. Kazee has rented the middle room of the Sharp building and is preparing to open up a bakery. Frank Leuck opened his new blacksmith shop for business Thursday. The sound of the hammer and anvil ring merrily all day long. — Brady Fowler opened the threshing season this week and is operating both a threshing machine and a huller in the fields adjacent to Nyssa. — A well 265 feet deep was drilled on the E. Rogers ranch in a record breaking time of 3 days. — Rev. Ira B. Aldrich, district superintendent, will hold the fourth quarter conference at the local M. E. church Sunday morning.

35 Years Ago—August 1, 1919

Lester More sustained burns on his feet while attempting to move a derrick under the live wires of the power line. — C. O. Wilson of Nampa sold his residence property in the north part of town to C. W. De Boer. — The Presbyterian church held its annual picnic on the lawn at the C. C. Hunt home. — Mr. and Mrs. Harry Goshert gave a party for Dwight Smith who just recently returned from army duty in France. — Prof. Ramo G. White, former principal of the Nyssa school, was visiting Henry Teutsch this week. Dewey Hoxie is making preparations to re-open the Nyssa garage. — Mayor T. J. Caldwell is unable to attend his official duties this week on account of a serious case of the mumps. — F. R. Mayes, foreman and linotypist of the Weiser American visited last Sunday with Rev. W. F. Shields.

40 Years Ago—July 30, 1914

Loaded with 40-head of cattle and 2 men—C. W. De Boer and Jack McDonald—the Snake river ferry boat sank near the Idaho side. Fortunately all escaped with nothing worse than a good ducking. The disaster was caused by the cattle crowding to one corner of the boat. — Sheriff Kerfoot nabbed the horse thief who had the audacity to steal Judge McKnight's horse and Sheriff Kerfoot's saddle. The man, E. C. Thompson, an escaped convict from the Oregon penitentiary, was captured at Lind, Wash. — This year's crop of hay is selling for \$5 per ton. — George Phillips, owner of the business block on First street is hard at work this week remodeling and improving the property. — Mr. and Mrs. John Kent and two sons, arrived from Boise and immediately proceeded to the Lyons coal mine property where they will spend a week or so rusticiating.

The boys spent the time working on advancement and playing a game. Refreshments were served to the members of the troop by Mrs. Hank Storm.

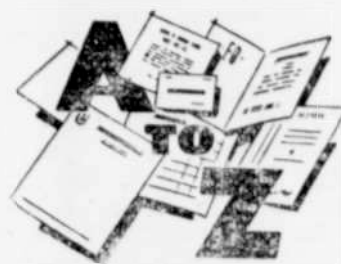

The Nyssa Toastmasters club held their regular meeting last Friday morning at 7:00 in Brownies cafe.

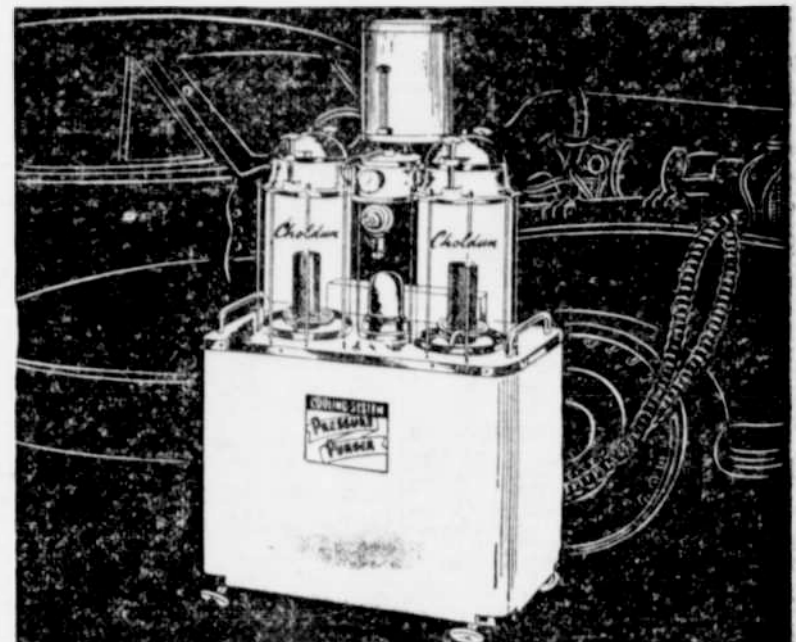
