Nebraska Produce Dealer Inspects Local Potatoes

More advertising of this area's agricultural products would greatly increase midwestern consumption, was an opinion expressed Monday by Edward F. German of Pierce, Nebr. German was making inquiry about potato and onion shipments from Nyssa and reported that he represents a produce wholesale firm of Norfolk and Gering, Nebr.

Nebraska consumes a tremendous amount of potatoes, most of which are shipped from Oregon and Idaho, but the "Idaho Potato" label has caused the shift from native cobbles to those grown in the irrigated sections of Oregon and Idaho, he reported. Onions from the lower Snake river valley also are in great demand in Nebraska, German said.

The Nebraska man stated that in his opinion most of the agricultural surpluses existing at various times could be completely eliminated if producers and associations would follow the policies of soap manufacturers which are able to sell all their new detergents by intensive advertising campaigns that appeal to the general public to purchase their products.

A new 25-pound paper bag with a mesh window should be an excellent means of helping sell more potatoes, German commented. The all-mesh bags, used in recent years, were an improvement over the bulk system of retailing, but some deterioration resulted from sunlight that entered all parts of the bag.
