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A Leader Leaves His Mark

"Our loss, their gain" editorials and eulogies frequently lose their meaning through repetitious use, so it might be well to say the same thing in a different way in discussing the recent change in the administrative department of the Nyssa school.

No one can deny that majority of the residents of this community were surprised and somewhat dejected when they learned that Henry H. Hartley is leaving here. Fourteen years is a long time, especially for a school superintendent, to remain in one place. During that time, Nyssa's schools have been built into the finest examples of public education facilities in the entire nation. Even though some subjects and extra-curricular activities that might be needed and wanted must remain for future realization, the all around educational program afforded youngsters from the first grade through high school can be excelled in no other community.

Through the leadership of Henry — as he was known to the general public, including many students—the entire community received an education. He set an example for tolerance and was one who could change his mind, one whose interests were in every segment of the community and a strong advocate of complete understanding of issues that might otherwise lead to controversies. He never segregated his own profession from all else as the only phase of society that mattered, but considered almost everything that makes up American life of equal importance.

To say that the schools will be weakened by his absence would be trite and untrue for the simple reason that his leadership and ideals permeated the entire community and spread to those who served under him. The new superintendent, R. V. "Dick" Wilson, will be able to continue to build a better school that has no goal other than to serve and improve along with changing times.

Like everyone else in the Nyssa school district, we'll miss Henry because of that mixture of leadership, ability and amiability, but his examples of the just means to those ends have been left behind with all of us. Dick is stepping into his shoes after more exposure to his boss' attributes than most of us and what we have seen of the new superintendent while he was principal of the high school has been good.

We're delighted to be able to say that both the Nyssa and North Bend schools will continue to progress.

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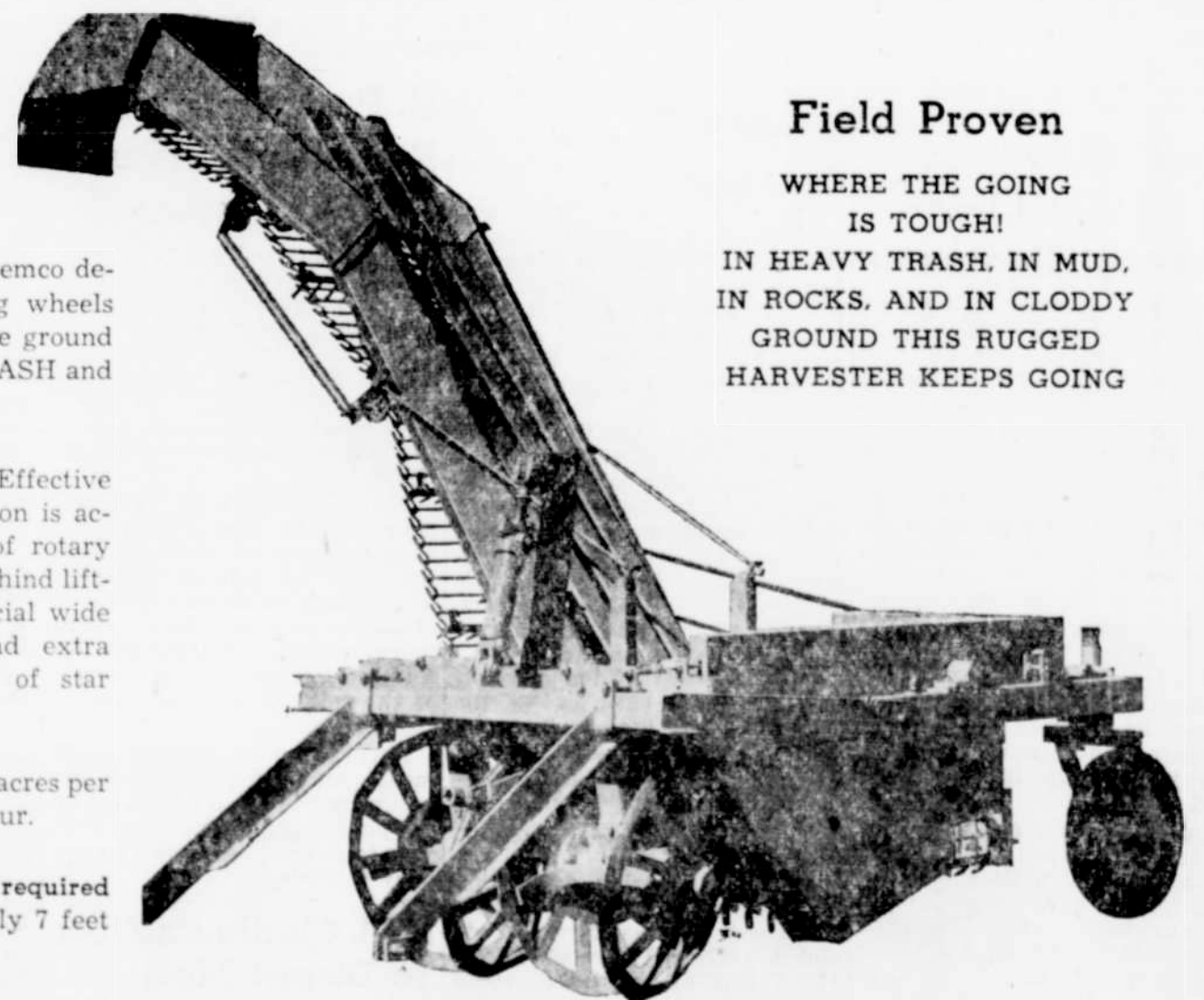
