The Grange decided to seek means of buying bale ties in large quantities at cheaper prices.

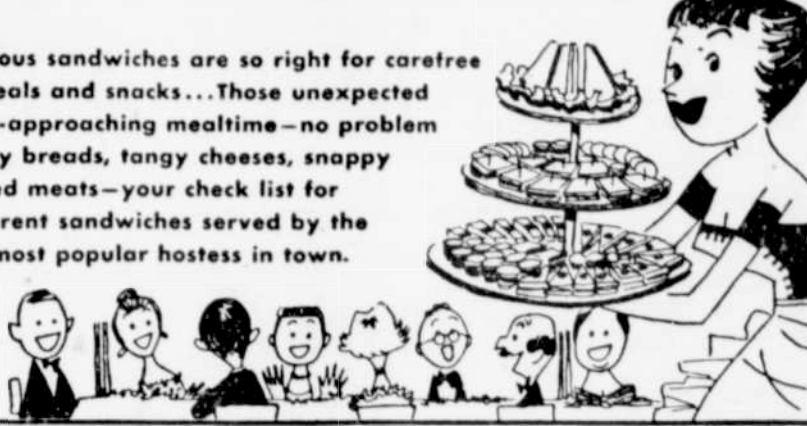
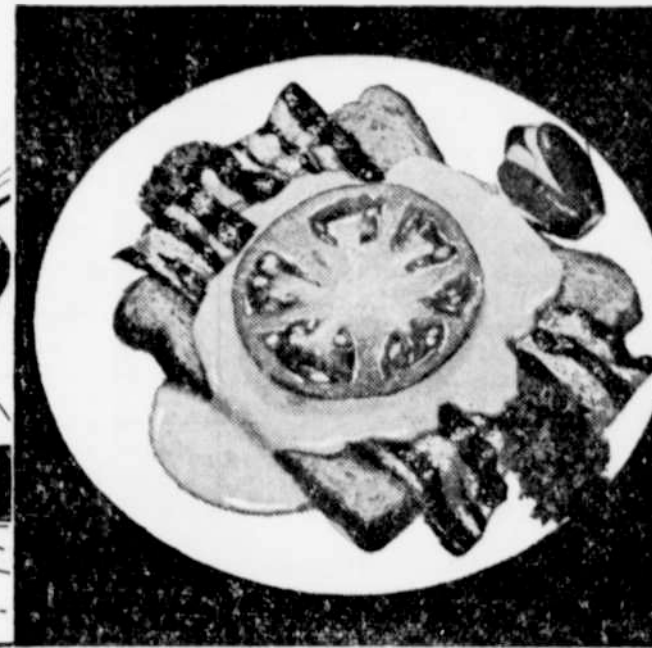
An announcement was made that the hall association will hold a pot luck dinner at 7 o'clock Sept. 7 and all Grangers were urged to attend.

Flake one 7-oz. can of tuna, combine with 1/2 cup diced celery and 1/4 cup diced stuffed olives. Add enough mayonnaise to moisten. Use as sandwich filling (enough for 4). Dip sandwiches in French Toast mixture (2 eggs, 1/2 cup salt, 1/2 cup undiluted Carnation Evaporated Milk, 1 tablespoon sugar). Brown on both sides in hot butter.

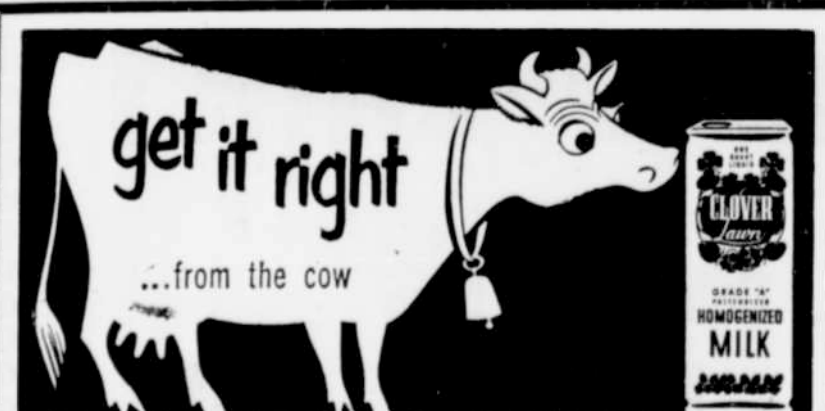
