They are a mixed race of all nationalities and are rovers and gamblers who have conditioned themselves into a versatility that makes it possible for them to meet and cope with just about any problem, whether it's presented individually or collectively.

The attempts to strike fear into the hearts of the American people for political gain sound hollow indeed when you look about and see that people are little different now than they were in 1849 or 1820.

Special music was presented by Laura Schenk.



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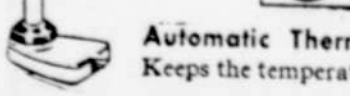
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
