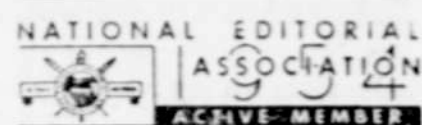

A Du Maurier best-seller and other recent titles were in circulation at the Malheur County Library on Saturday, Sept. 25.

Mary Anne is Daphne Du Maurier's novel about the ruthless charm and cunning of a young woman in the early 1800's who happened to be the author's ancestor.

Rebel Heiress by Robert Neill, author of The Elegant Witch, is a novel of Restoration England. Richard Carey returned to England to wrest his father's estate from Colonel Paget and found himself beset by difficulties.

A novel about immigrants from Sweden adjusting to life in Minnesota in the middle of the nineteenth century is Unto a Good Land by Vilhelm Moberg. It is translated from the Swedish.

The Wild Place by Kathryn Hulme tells of an American woman's experiences rescuing and resettling two million homeless people found in Germany at the end of World War II.

The story of the Swamp Fox's campaigns against the British in South Carolina during the Revolution is the background for The Red Doe, a novel by Katherine Simons, which tells how Lex Mourn found his true love.

Silent Army by Chin Kee Onn is a novel of Malayan guerrilla warfare during the Japanese invasion, written by a Malayan Chinese.
