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Political Themes and Issues

Tennessee's U. S. Sen. Estes Kefauver honored Malheur county this week by appearing here in behalf of Oregon Democratic candidates for various offices. The man who became famous for his crime syndicate investigations and for his con skin cap, demonstrated his versatility by giving a non-political talk at the Nyssa Lions club meeting Monday noon and a hard-hitting campaign speech at Ontario Monday evening.

His political talk was presented with lots of vigor, but it was something new to Eastern Oregon in view of the vitriolic speeches and press releases to which we have become accustomed from Al Ullman, Democratic candidate for U. S. congressman, and Richard Neuberger, Democratic candidate for U. S. senator. The man from Tennessee, although critical of the Republican administration, refrained from personal attacks and acknowledged by such an approach that President Eisenhower, as an individual, is still popular with a vast majority of the voters of both political faiths.

The off-shore oil issue and Hells Canyon dam are the two main themes of Oregon Democratic leaders' campaign and were the principal issues discussed by Sen. Kefauver. The former issue has never been explained in detail and the latter has been so thoroughly cussed and discussed for the past nine years by proponents and opponents that the average voter is confused.

Ullman and Neuberger have been basing their arguments about the off-shore oil give away on lost revenue for schools. Sen. Kefauver stated that profits from the tidelands oil, if federal ownership had been retained, would amount to \$300 billion, or enough revenue to pay off the national debt.

Without considering the pros and cons of funds for schools, it is fair to ask why this issue was not settled sometime between 1933 and 1953 when the Democratic party had control of both houses of congress every session except one.

On Hells Canyon dam, we believe we are among the majority in being so confused we don't know what it's all about; we are among the minority in admitting our ignorance even after reading and listening to millions of words on all six sides.

Opinions about Hells Canyon dam are divided six ways, which might be something like this: (1) those who want a high dam plus complete control of all power; (2) those who want a high dam and the power sold to a private utility; (3) those who want low dams built with private capital; (4) those who hate the Idaho Power Co.; (5) those who are confused; (6) those who don't give a dam.
