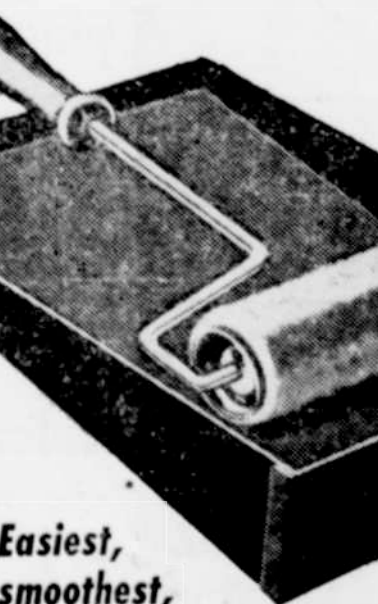

Vale scored for the last time early in the second half after recovering the Nyssa fumble.

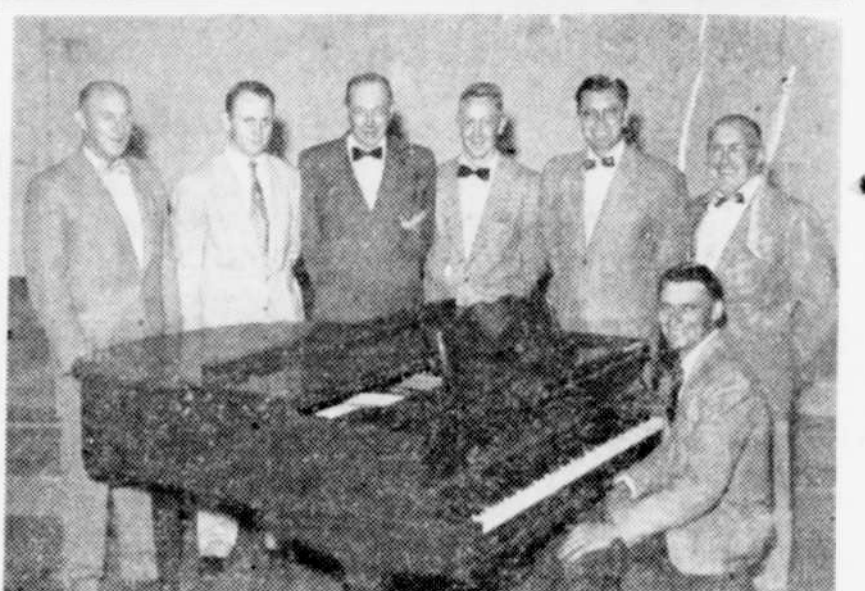
The rest of the second half was an exchange of plays with neither team being able to threaten. The final score was Vale 27 Nyssa 0.
