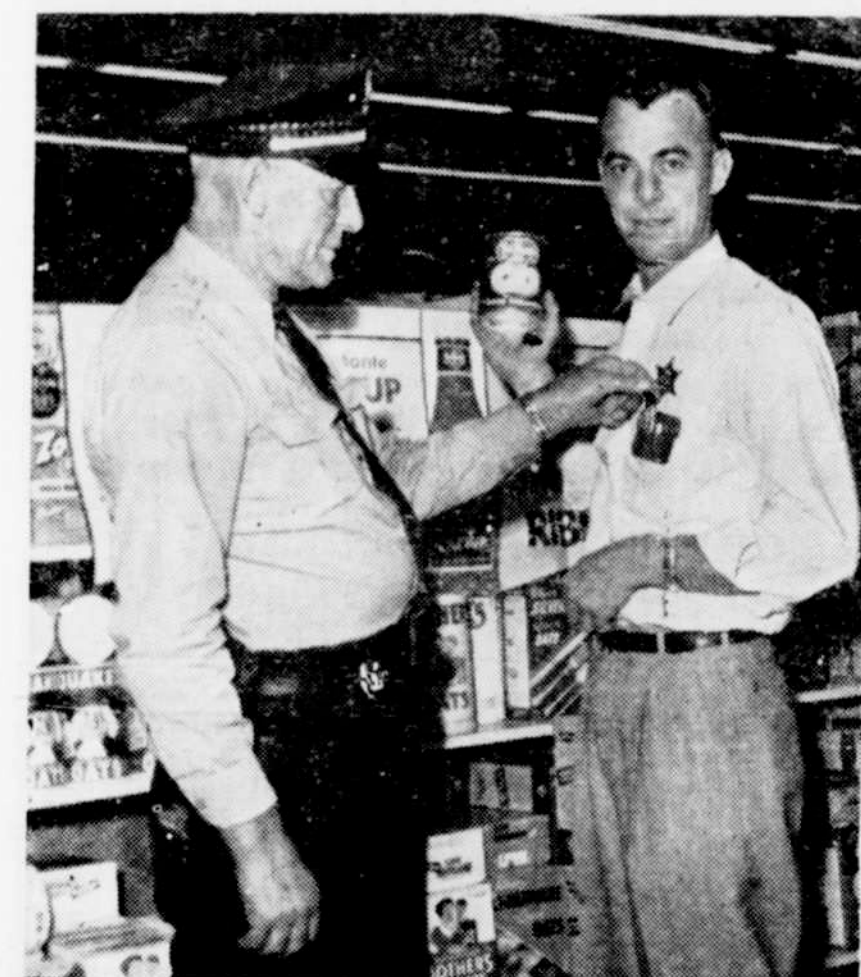
Sgt. Haney and his family moved last week.

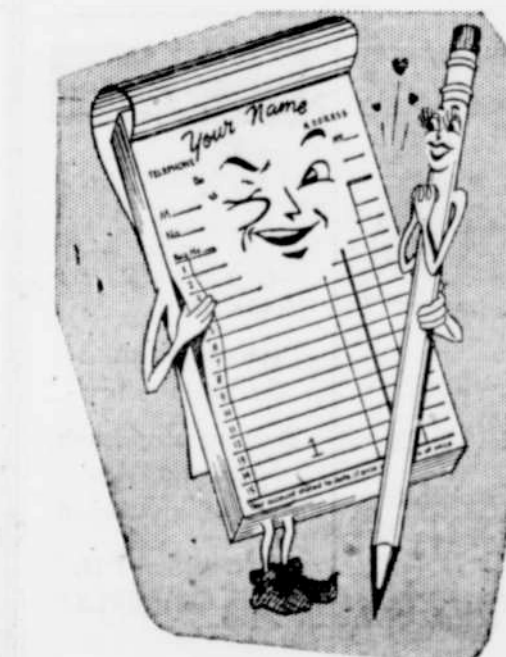
