SENATOR CHARGES GOP WITH BROKEN PROMISES

tion and abandonment of old friends has lost the leadership he said, and "we are not regaining it with the policies of Dulles."

"We must have a Democratic congress to get back to our bipartisan foreign policy," Kefauver said.

He condemned the reduction in farm parity prices and charged that 90 percent of parity had been promised. Secretary of Agriculture Ezra Benson had cut them lower than they are now, but the Democrats in congress were successful in bringing them back up to 82 percent, the speaker said. "We must keep the farmer on an even keel. We cannot protect the worker and industry and throw the farmer to the four winds," he said.

Unemployment Kefauver asserted that the unemployed now total four million and compared times with 1929 with the income of farmers "going down, down and down." He went on to state, "If Benson would try to find new markets abroad instead of ending parities, farmers would not have these problems."

Launching into the tidelands oil issue, Kefauver charged that the recent decision on off-shore oil was a payoff to the oil companies. He stated that \$300 billions would have been available for education or enough to pay off the national debt if the federal government had retained the oil. He accused the administration of switching on and off a hard money policy and of favoring General Electric in granting government contracts.

On public power, Kefauver said the power companies are

getting a strangle-hold and stated that if Hells Canyon dam is lost, it will be gone forever. "The partnership plan simply means the government puts up all the money and holding companies get all the profits," the speaker stated.

He praised the Hells Canyon dam association and said that when the Secretary of the Interior abandoned Hells Canyon dam, the association carried on the fight.

Important Election

"This is an important election and it will determine whether the utilities take over and take us back 20 years. 'If this man (speaking for Al Ullman, Democratic candidate for U. S. representative) is elected the administration will know you have repudiated the administration power policy,' Sen. Kefauver said.

Prior to the Tennesseean's speech, Ullman lashed out at his opponent, Republican Sam Coon, by charging that he voted with the special interests and against the interests of the Eastern Oregon farmers. "It is the worst situation since the depression and I will work for the farmers' interests instead of for eastern financiers," Ullman said.

Ullman asserted that his opponent had voted with special interests on income taxes and against the people of Eastern Oregon and went on to elaborate on the tidelands issue, which he said had been settled for special interests. "My opponent has gone down the line with Douglas McKay in the give-away of our natural resources," the candidate said.

"Hell's Canyon is an issue in this election. If it goes to special interests it (the low dams) will make money for the Idaho Power Co.'s eastern stockholders," Ullman said. "You're voting on Hells Canyon in November and if you lose all hope of low-cost power, you lose hope of a chance for industry and you will have power rate increases. It is the most crucial issue Eastern Oregon has ever seen," Ullman said.

Thomas Jones, county Democratic chairman, presided at the meeting and the principal speaker was introduced by County Judge Loyd Rae of Baker county.

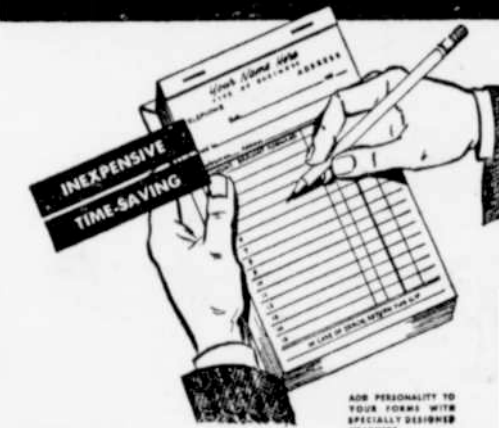
ENTIRE BIBLE IS RETOLD IN PICTURES FOR SUNDAY SCHOOLS



The story of Creation (above) begins the complete story of the Bible in full-color picture strips for use in Sunday schools throughout the country. "Our Bible in Pictures" is a new feature of Sunday Pix, a 12-page picture weekly that is distributed to more than a million Sunday school students of all denominations. It is the first time such a project has ever been undertaken for Sunday schools. Editors estimate it will take three or four years for the entire Bible, from Genesis to Revelations, to be pictorialized in weekly installments. The David C. Cook Publishing Company of Elgin, Ill., which produces Sunday Pix, decided to undertake it because it feels that cartoon strips, which have been used so long and successfully by newspapers to entertain their readers, are a particularly effective educator. "Our Bible in Pictures" is expected to give its young readers a religious background they will never forget.

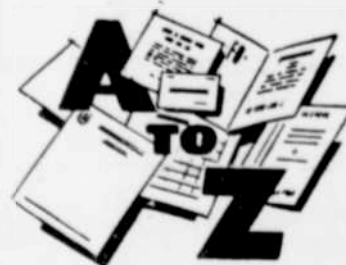
