Another guest, Mrs. Rataeyk's niece, Rita Czatewski left for San Francisco Sunday.

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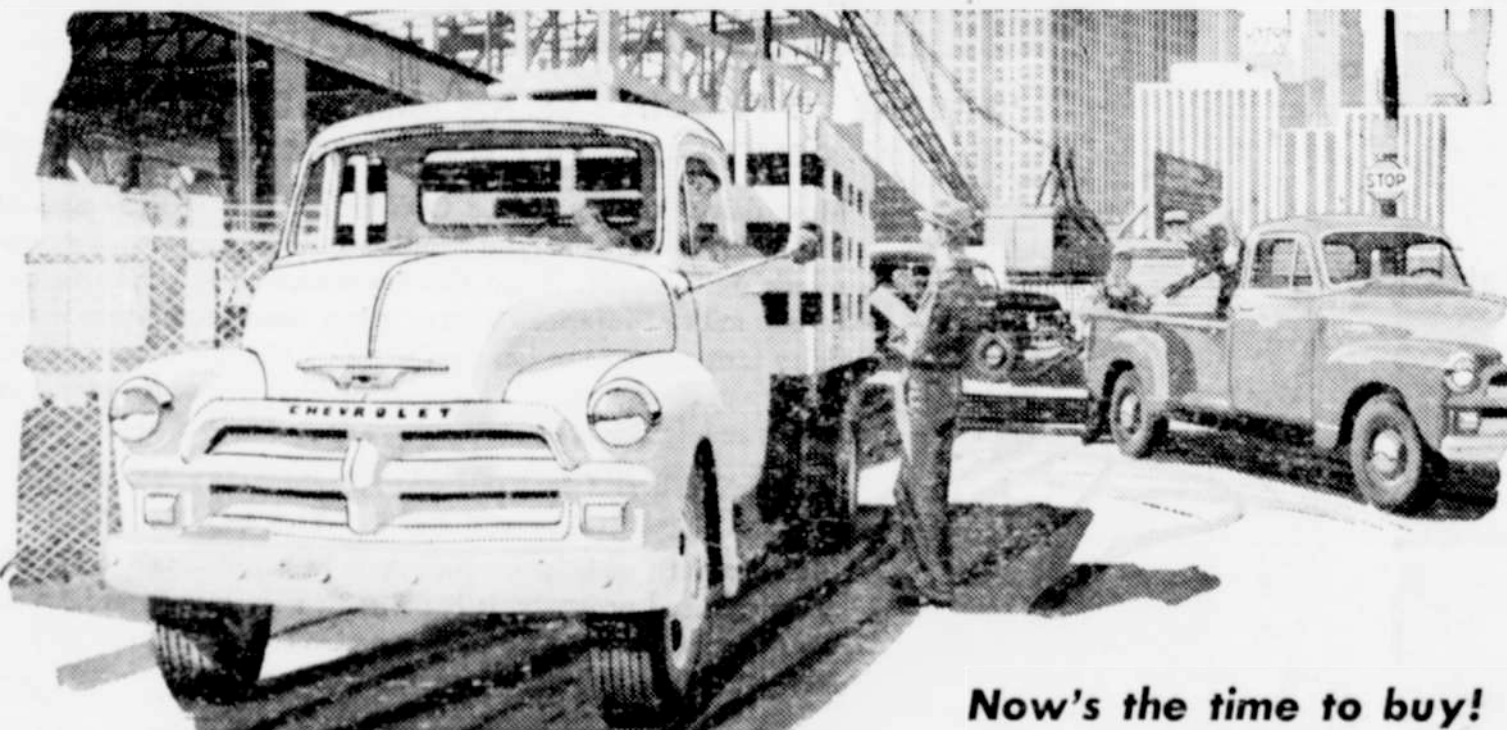
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
