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SUBSCRIPTION RATES
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How The Candidates Stand

In The Nyssa Gate City Journal Subscription Campaign

Each active candidate in this campaign is sure of earning a bicycle or a cash commission as there will be one prize bicycle and four cash commissions for each five active candidates.

The candidates are separated into two districts. Those living outside the city limits of Nyssa are in District Number One, and those living inside the city limits of Nyssa are in District Number two, but any candidate may secure subscriptions from anyone, anywhere.

The first two choices of prize bicycles will be given to the highest candidate in each district. . . the higher of the two district winners having first choice and the high candidate in the other district having second choice.
