## Bulldogs Win First Home Game By Close Margin Over Wolverines

The Bulldogs left the gridiron Friday night victorious over the Weiser team in their first game of the season.

A total of 15 penalties didn't stop the Bulldogs from beating Weiser 13-6 in a fairly close game.

Most of the game was played on Weiser's end of the field. Several times the Bulldogs went deep into Weiser's territory but didn't have what it took to score. Nyssa defense was fairly tough and was able to hold Weiser on a close leash.

Nyssa drew first blood early in the third quarter on a long drive by all of the backs. Then they called on Giron to drive into the end zone for the score. Giron's attempt for the extra point was no good and Nyssa led 6-0.

In the third quarter both teams were held, but early in the fourth Weiser tied up the score and failed to make their extra point.

Larry Schenk caught fire in the last half of the fourth quarter, when he broke loose for two long runs, one for 60 and the other for about 35 yards to set up the play for Giron to score for Nyssa's second touchdown. The try for the extra point was good and the Bulldogs went out in front 13-6.

With only a few minutes left Weiser started a drive only to have it halted by a pass interception by Nyssa to run the clock out. The final score was 13-6 for Nyssa.

## Jaycees Lease Lot, Building To Make Recreation Area

The Nyssa Junior Chamber of Commerce has acquired a ten-year lease on a tract of land and a building from the City of Nyssa. The lease will require payment of \$1 per year.

The Jaycees, however, are contracted and pledged under the terms of the lease to build and maintain a softball and/or baseball diamond for the use of the city or groups in the city and to let the recreation hall be used by any bonafide community or civic group with no discrimination as to race, creed or color.

The Jaycees must also keep up the property, make necessary repairs, remodel, clean and pay all fire insurance premiums on the building.

The city must furnish water and sewer facilities and grass seed.

The building is approximately 20 by 100 feet. The tract of land is 484 feet long by approximately the depth of a city block.

The property and building is off King Ave. at about 4th St. The building was formerly a vet's housing project structure.
