experience in an office similar to the post he seeks, only on a smaller scale, by serving on the Nyssa city council and on district 26C school board, both of which bring demands from the public.

The Democratic candidate knows how to meet the public and is adept at explaining any stand he might take on any issue. He is not afraid to express his opinions and uses diplomacy in doing so.

County Judge Race

The contest for county judge has been "clean" so far, even though Murray Morton, Democratic candidate, is making somewhat of an issue of the courthouse purchase proposal in his efforts to unseat Republican incumbent G. Y. "Red" Chester.

The incumbent county judge was appointed last year to fill the unexpired term of the late Sewell Stanton and won the Republican nomination over three opponents at the May primary election. Chester has been economy minded on just about every matter that concerns the expenditures of tax funds. In fact, he has spoken out so strongly against appropriations for various departments that he at one time or another has antagonized one or more groups of citizens. He has been able to bounce right back into popularity even after irate delegations have appeared in his office to "work him over" for his views or actions in connection with cuts in county funds. Chester, probably more than any other official, has been responsible for renewed public interest in county affairs.

Morton is a native of Malheur county, attended school at Valley View, Cairo, Ontario and a Boise business college and was appointed deputy assessor in 1916. He and his brother operated the Olds Ferry between Weiser and Huntington until the state built a highway on the Oregon side of

Utah Senator Speaks Here For Sen. Guy Cordon

Terming himself a self-invited interloper for Guy Cordon, Sen. Wallace F. Bennett, Utah Republican, asserted that Sen. Cordon has one of the best legal minds in the U. S. Senate. "I can't believe the people of Oregon would reject a man like that," Sen. Bennett said at a GOP-sponsored meeting Wednesday night of last week at the Nyssa high school.

The Utah senator called attention to Cordon's seniority and the fact that he is chairman of the interior and insular affairs committee, a member of the appro-

priations committee, chairman of the sub-committee for appropriations for interior and insular affairs and a member of the atomic energy committee. A new man starts at the bottom under the rules of the senate, Bennett stated.

Four-Point Program

Sen. Bennett praised the Eisenhower program and said that most of it has been enacted. In citing the accomplishments, he said that the program can be divided into four parts with peace heading the list. "We have begun to move away from a wartime psychology in the direction of peace," the Utah man said. He asserted that Dulles is doing an excellent job of establishing a pattern of good relationships on the outside and said that the terror of the atomic bomb and nuclear fission is so great, with possible germ warfare added, that war may be too expensive even for the Russians.

The revised Federal Housing program makes it easier for individuals to get home loans and have a longer payment period, the speaker said. The administration has rooted out those who knew the right people and were able to pocket about a half million dollars, Bennett stated. Extension of social security to add 10 million people and the addition of a four million people for unemployment compensation benefits, were cited as the third important accomplishment of the Eisenhower administration.

State Candidates

The contest for governor between Republican incumbent Paul Patterson and Democrat Joseph K. Carson Jr. seems to be little more than a "matter of form" insofar as members of both parties are concerned in this part of the state. Democrats and Republicans alike are taking the attitude that Gov. Patterson already is re-elected. Carson has done little or no campaigning in Eastern Oregon, his one trip here a few weeks ago was not effective because he was overshadowed by other candidates. His principal plank in his platform is construction of a high dam in Hells Canyon and "cleaning out the Republican entrenched bureaus."

Congressional Race Hot

The entire campaign has centered around two teams of candidates: Richard L. Neuberger, Democratic candidate for U. S. senator, and Albert C. Ullman, Democratic candidate for second district congressman, as opposed to the Republican incumbents, Guy Cordon and Sam Coon, U. S. senator and congressman, respectively.

Like Oregon's neighboring state, Idaho, the congressional race is somewhat unique in that the extreme liberal and conservative in American politics are represented. Neuberger and Ullman place Hells Canyon first and foremost in their arguments for their election and have attacked their opponents personally from the beginning of the campaign. They have appeared in Malheur county on several occasions and most of the efforts and funds of the Malheur Democratic central committee have gone to support these two state candidates, rather than local candidates.

Cordon and Coon have been campaigning on what they term their records in congress. The last few days Cordon has struck back at his opponent, Neuberger, but Coon has remained aloof to personalities. His stock answer to charges of "give-away" has been calling attention to his voting record and "pleading guilty to favoring private enterprise."

There are three uncontested positions for which there are Republican candidates, but no Democrats. Certain of election are E. Otis Smith, district attorney; A. P. Goodell, county commissioner to succeed himself, and George Beechler, county coroner, the position he now holds.

Different Approaches
While the county Democratic organization has been concentrating on their candidates for U. S. senator and congressman, the Malheur Republican central committee has been working on both state and local levels.

The county GOP during the past few days has been going from door-to-door, has raised additional funds and are putting up a hard battle for Charley Swan for state representative and G. Y. Chester for county judge. They are continuing to work for their state candidates and are exerting considerable effort to make certain their unopposed candidates are not forgotten.

When asked about the controversial Dixon-Yates contract, Sen. Bennett explained that the TVA was originally planned to develop the water power and other potentials on the Tennessee river, but it has been expanded beyond that, he said. Millions of dollars have been appropriated and there was danger of complete federalization of power. When funds were asked for power for an atomic energy plant, a contract was made with a group of electric utilities to furnish the power instead of building new steam propelled generators, Bennett said.

On foreign issues, the Utah senator said that Indo-China is "down the drain" and that in six months the Communists will take over. Nehru is making gestures to Russia, knowing the U. S. will not attack and that India can oppose this country with no fear of harm, Bennett said. The Philippines and Japan are a moral responsibility of this country and if Russia ever attacks, the United States will move in, Sen. Bennett predicted.

Putting basic economic factors on a sound basis and making it possible for the nation to move toward a solid foundation, is the fourth and most important accomplishment of the administration, Sen. Bennett said. He stated that the cost of government has been reduced \$7 billion, one half of which is a savings to the people. In defending reduction in corporation taxes, Bennett asserted that every tax a corporation pays shows up in what it sells and any savings will be passed on to the people.

Sugar Quota Problem

When asked about the sugar quota, Sen. Bennett said that various factors in the sugar industry must get together and come to congress with a proposal. Many states have no sugar production and congressional delegations have pressure from consumer groups, which, added to differences of opinion among sugar producers makes it rough, the Utah senator said. He stated that Cuba and Puerto Rico must be considered and the Democrats are especially anxious to please Puerto Rico.

The cost of labor is responsible for 95 percent of the cost of things you buy, Bennett stated, and the profit of industry is never more than five percent before taxes. "The Democrats created the problem by allying with labor

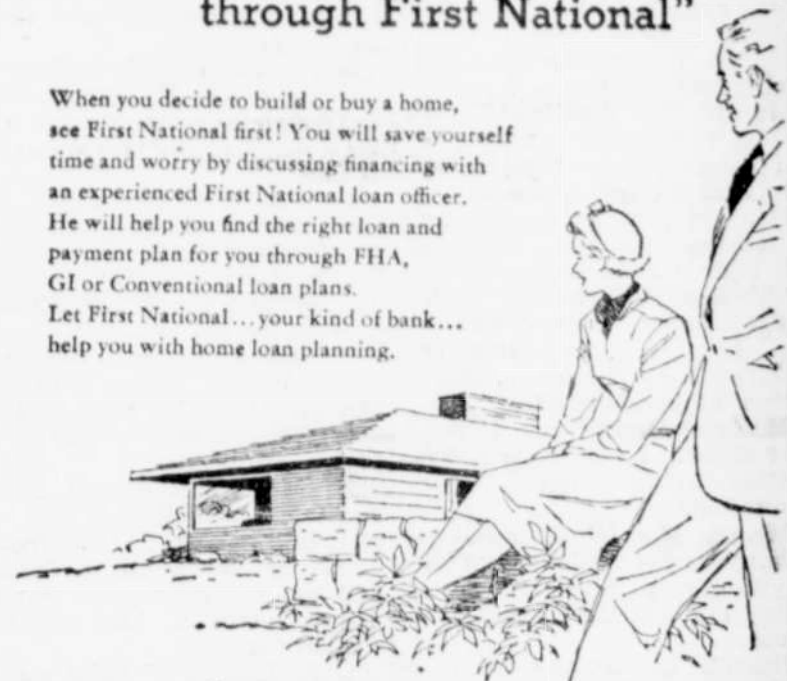
