Second Livestock Feeders' Day Is Set for Nov. 20

The second annual fall livestock Feeder's Day will be held at the Malheur experiment station on Saturday, Nov. 20 from 10 a. m. until 12 noon. The field day will be a part of the program for the annual meeting of the Malheur Livestock association whose meeting is in Ontario Nov. 19 and 20, according to E. N. Hoffman, Superintendent. This will make it possible for livestock operators to attend both meetings with a minimum of traveling.

The feeding program will be similar to that of last year in which cattle representing the five grades of feeder cattle will be fed alike. Cattle on feed will be penned separately into lots of choice, good, medium, common and inferior grades. There will be 10 head of each grade.
