10 Years Ago—Nov. 16, 1944

The Chamber of Commerce voted to spend \$50 for the purchase of Christmas trees for the Main street. — Bill Hipp of Nyssa sustained a fracture of the ankle Armistice day when he was kicked by a horse ridden by Doc Marshall. After he was kicked Hipp fell off his horse breaking his collar bone. — The latest fashions will be modeled at the hospital benefit show sponsored by the Lions club, by such famous models as Bob Thompson, Mayor Herschel Thompson, Lloyd Lewis and Claude Wilson. — The Nyssa quota of the 6th war bond drive set at \$142,500. Bernard Frost is chairman. — R. G. Larson, district manager of the Amalgamated sugar company indicated that farmers in the Nyssa-Nampa district will receive \$12.50 per ton for their 1944 beets.

15 Years Ago—Nov. 16, 1939

J. W. Hayes, grew a carrot in his garden that weighed 8 3/4 pounds. — Sugar beet payments made by the Amalgamated Sugar Co. to the growers totaled \$619,074. This represents beets delivered to the factory during October. — Zack Walker lost his threshing machine by fire at the Theo Rust place. 80 acres of clover seed in the stack and hay were also burned. — Asa Roberts, Jr., was injured when a horse kicked him in the head. — Building permits were issued by City Recorder Morris Solomon to Wyatt Smith and John Points. — Bill De Groff was elected as master of the Oregon Trail Grange. — Dennis Toomb leased the Clara Linders farm southwest of Nyssa and moved his family there from their home in Nyssa. — The FSA transient labor camp closed this week. — Frank Morgan attended the Oregon Reclamation Congress as a delegate to the National Congress held in Denver.

25 Years Ago—Nov. 15, 1929

A thief who gave his name as Haskins, stole a beef from the Independent Market at Ontario, was caught by C. W. Glenn at Klamath Falls. — The Rosebud is putting in a new soda fountain and lunch counter. — Dick Tensen, Frank Morgan, Roy Willoughby and George Phillips left for Watson where they will act as witness in the condemnation case involving land the government is trying to buy for the Owyhee dam. — V. V. Hickox, was elected master of the Grange in the Big Bend community. — About \$110 was taken in at the library benefit dinner held in the

Methodist church basement. — The Charles Schweizer family moved from Hood River to Nyssa this week. — P. M. Pinkley is building a garage onto his residence.

30 Years Ago—Nov. 14, 1924

H. Harlan is running the Leuck Blacksmith Shop during the illness of Frank Leuck. — Eddie Powell has completed a new auto washing rack at the rear of his filling station. The rack lies across the Wilson ditch on a level with the ground and is very easy of access. — The state highway crew, which for the past month has been fixing up the Oregon Trail between Nyssa and Cario, finished the job and have moved to Ontario. — Old-timers say the signs—tight corn husks on corn, extra heavy hair on farm animals and feathers on fowls, indicate a long, cold winter coming. A great many farmers are preparing for just such weather, too, judging from the big loads of sage brush being daily hauled from the hills. P. M. Warren is opening up a coal yard alongside his flour mill.

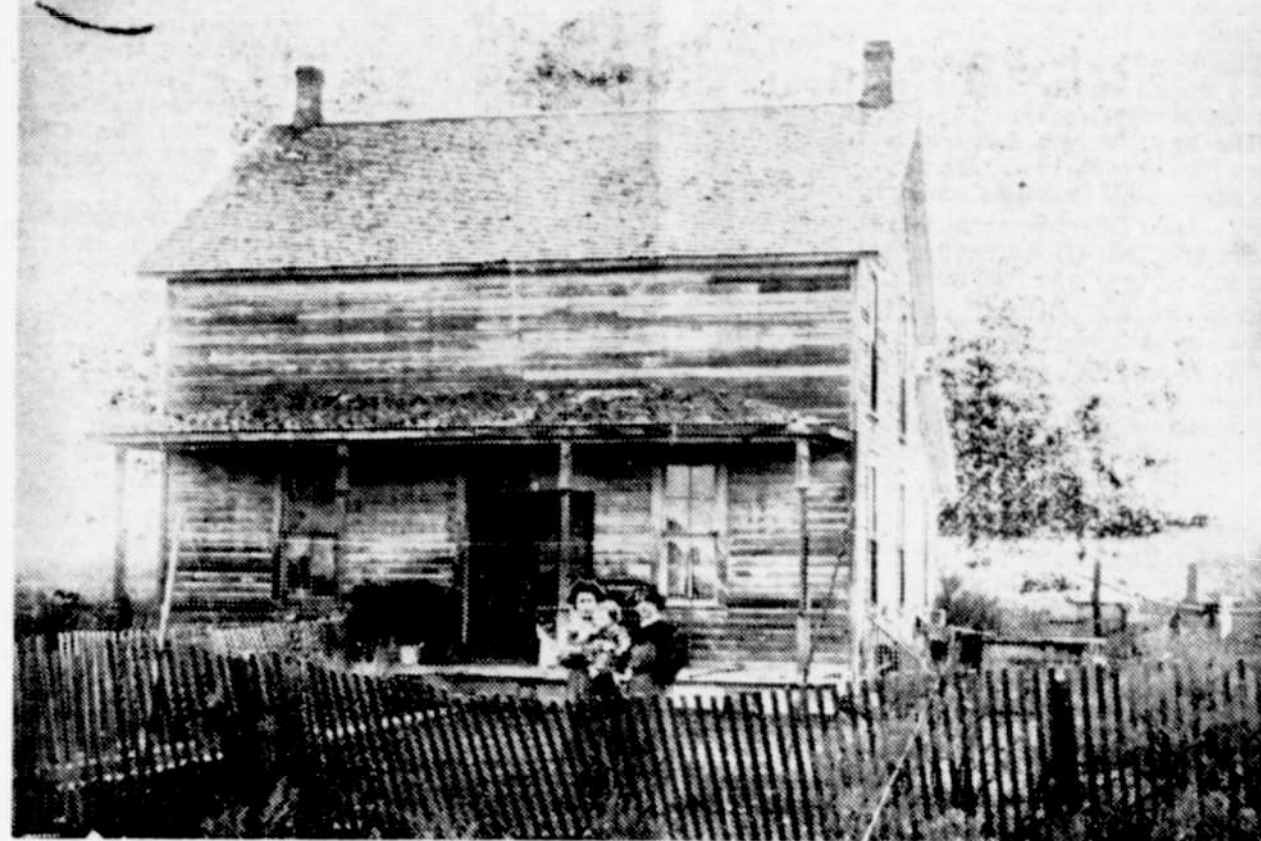
35 Years Ago—Nov. 17, 1919

De Bord, who returned from a year's military spent in Serbia is visiting his brother, F. L. De Bord. — S. D. Bigelow is busy clearing the land which he recently purchased from Arthur King. — Mr. Brooke, who has been agent for the Eastern Oregon Land Co., has resigned his position and Mr. Lorenzen is his successor. The Brooke family left for Red Bluff, Calif. — The team belonging to Hank Teutsch ran away Monday and were captured near the schoolhouse. Ed Christensen and Win Brown are erecting a bungalow. When completed they will have a five-room modern house with front and back porches and a basement.

40 Years Ago—Nov. 13, 1914

Pete Tensen lost four valuable horses that were hitched to a hay derrick, which came in contact with the live wires of the electric power line. The horses were killed instantly. — Some miscreant, stole all of W. W. Smith's potato crop during his absence from his farm, from 4 acres of choice spuds. Current fiction, a Broadway play, a TV personality's book on managing children, and a chatty book on nutrition are included in the titles going into circulation at the Malheur County Library on Saturday, Nov. 13.

William Faulkner's new novel is called A Fable and in telling about a meeting in the trenches during World War I portrays by means of people and experiences that are familiar in our lives the tragedy and triumph of the crucifixion and resurrection.

The Victorian Chaise Lounge is Marghanita Laski's novel about a young woman transported into

Victorian times and the life of an unhappy ancestor, as she falls asleep on an antique chaise lounge.

Inside Nantucket is by the co-author of Cheaper by the Dozen, Frank Gilbreth. He tells the story of Bob and Barbara Gilbreth's experiences as apprentice innkeepers.

Heavy Rainfall Makes Duck Pond

Rain from Saturday night through most of Monday caused water to back up at various intersections throughout town, one of which was the corner of Bowler and North Second in front of Pounds Grocery operated by Glenn Adams. Adams placed several decoys on the water along with a warning sign to keep out all duck hunters.

Among other intersections where water was backed up was the corner of Good and South Fifth.

Adams was reported to have provided the special duck pond for the benefit of city councilmen.

The group had originally intended to participate in the square dance exhibition in Nampa but Leon Rosa, Caldwell, chairman of that group, had made other arrangements.

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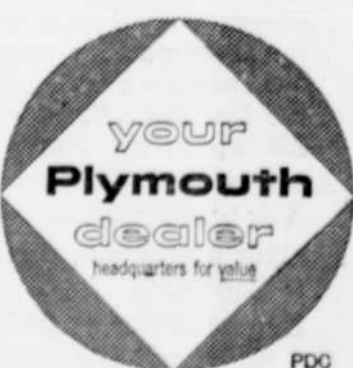
