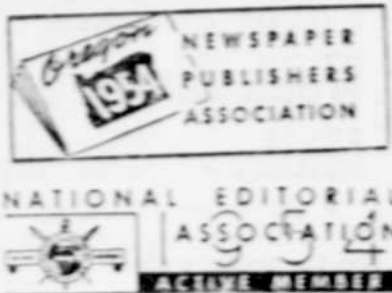

More Class Rooms Needed

Eligible voters in the Nyssa school district will be able to vote just two weeks from tomorrow on two different sets of bonds; one in the amount of \$275,000 for expansion of classroom facilities for the elementary school and the other in the amount of \$175,000 for a cafeteria, a shop and a music room.

Cost of the bonds for both proposals will be between 5 and 6 additional mills of taxes. Cost of the \$275,000 bonds for the classroom expansion only will be about 3.5 mills. Voters are being urged to consider both proposals with the utmost care. They should ask questions of their neighbors, they should quiz the school faculty and members of the school board. Voters in this district are more fortunate than those of some areas—they can get complete and truthful answers to all their questions.

After all the questions are answered, the taxpayers should sit down and figure out how much their taxes will be for the next few years; they should determine the amount of money that will have to be paid each month for the new addition and for the cafeteria.

The \$275,000 bond issue for additional land and a building for new class rooms is a must and should be considered favorably. The \$175,000 bond issue for the cafeteria, shops and music room would be an excellent addition, but such a question should be determined by the voters themselves.

The new classrooms would cost a taxpayer, whose home is assessed at \$3000, about \$10.50 a year, or less than \$1 a month. The investment in the youngsters who will be tomorrow's citizens is indeed small compared with the value received.

We cannot deny that it's those "small \$10 here, another \$10 somewhere else" that add up to make taxes high. There are numerous other places where cuts can be made even though various boards and bureaus don't bring the privilege to decide, right to the taxpayers as does the school board.

We're delighted that voters don't have to be approached with pleas to improve their schools, replace dangerous buildings or take care of unfulfilled obligations. Residents of the Nyssa area have been most generous in providing some of the best schools in the northwest. They have been fortunate in having administrators who place all the problems and issues directly in front of them.

We haven't the slightest doubt about the success of the bond election Dec. 10 to expand the school system.

During the lighting of the candles, Scripture passages are read pertaining to the coming of the Messiah and the congregation prays an Advent prayer. Some of the young people in the church will lead the congregation in these services.

The meaning behind the lighting of the Advent Candles is, of course, our preparation for the coming of the Child of Bethlehem as the Savior of the world to rule over a Kingdom that shall have no end. In these days of almost

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Lady Missionary To Speak Sunday Eve.

Mrs. Elmer G. Boyer, bookkeeper, secretary and teacher, will be guest speaker at the National Woman's Day program at the Christian church Sunday evening, Nov. 28, at 8 o'clock. For thirty years, Mrs. Boyer has been following her professions in the Belgian Congo, deep in the heart of equatorial Africa as a missionary for Disciples of Christ under the auspices of the United Christian Missionary society.

With her husband, Mrs. Boyer was first stationed at Bolenge, where the equator cuts the continent. They both taught in the mission station schools. She was also mission treasurer and office assistant for the entire Congo Christian mission of six stations. The Boyers then served at Mondombe and Wema, when it was a new station among primitive people, less than a generation removed from cannibalism. Here they continued to teach and carry on evangelistic work, spending much of it supervising the native teachers in the outlying village schools.
