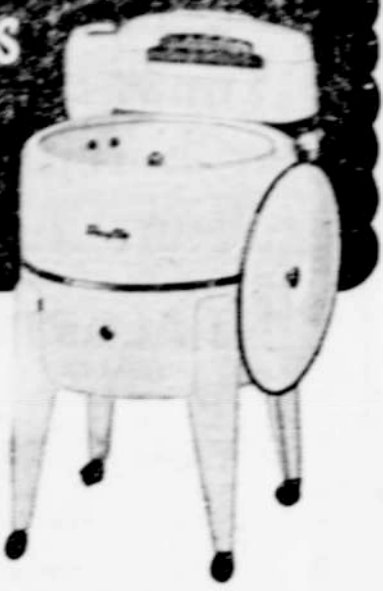

A Department Cuts Red Tape

Oregon's State Highway department is to be commended
for the quick action that made possible the resump-
tion of all motor vehicle traffic on highways 20 and 26
just eight days after one span of the Nyssa bridge top-
pled into the Snake river.

State officials were in Nyssa and had crews working
to clear away debris a short time after the structure gave
way. Within a few hours, four crews were working
around the clock under the direction of P. M. Stevenson,
state bridge engineer, who came here from Salem. In
spite of several set-backs and a few break-downs, traffic
was flowing between the two states by Sunday after-
noon of this week.

Nyssans rather enjoyed operating a ferry boat and
taxi service and the hundreds of persons who used the
facilities each day took it in their stride in spite of cold
weather and a little dampness when the waves acted up.

The Journal joins other Nyssans in expressing our
gratitude to the highway department for a job well done.
We must admit that our chief delight is the definite
proof that Oregon has at least one department that can
cut right through all entanglements of red tape when an
emergency arises.

Authoritative sources in Salem are definite in their
statements that a new concrete bridge will be started
this spring. Since Idaho must share in the cost of this
structure and since a new bridge at Nyssa was not plan-
ned when the current highway department budget was
made, more red tape will have to be cut.

We predict that the situation will be capably handled
by some of the men who visited Nyssa from Salem dur-
ing the eight days that a motor boat was necessary for
commuters and travelers.
