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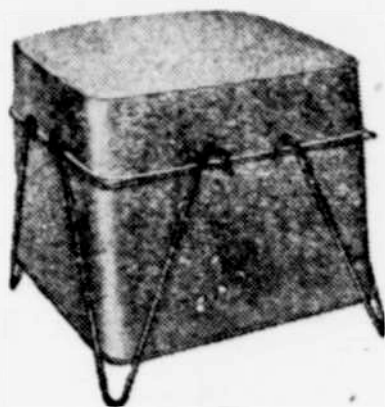
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\$4.75**Nyssa-Nampa Beet Growers President Tells of Plans To Ask Congress for Opportunity To Expand With Nation**

The western sugar beet industry plans to ask Congress for the right to expand along with the other industries of the growing nation, William M. Carson, president of the Nyssa-Nampa Beet Growers association, declared while in Denver last week.

Carson told of the industry's plans during the two-day ninth annual meeting of the National Beet Growers federation, Dec. 7 and 8 at the Albany hotel. More than 300 sugar beet industry leaders from nine western states gathered for the sessions.

"We want to be allowed to progress along with the natural population growth of the country," Carson said. "In Idaho, we have the land, the water, the people, and the know-how to expand sugar beet production. But no expansion is permitted us under restrictive terms of the 1948 sugar act."

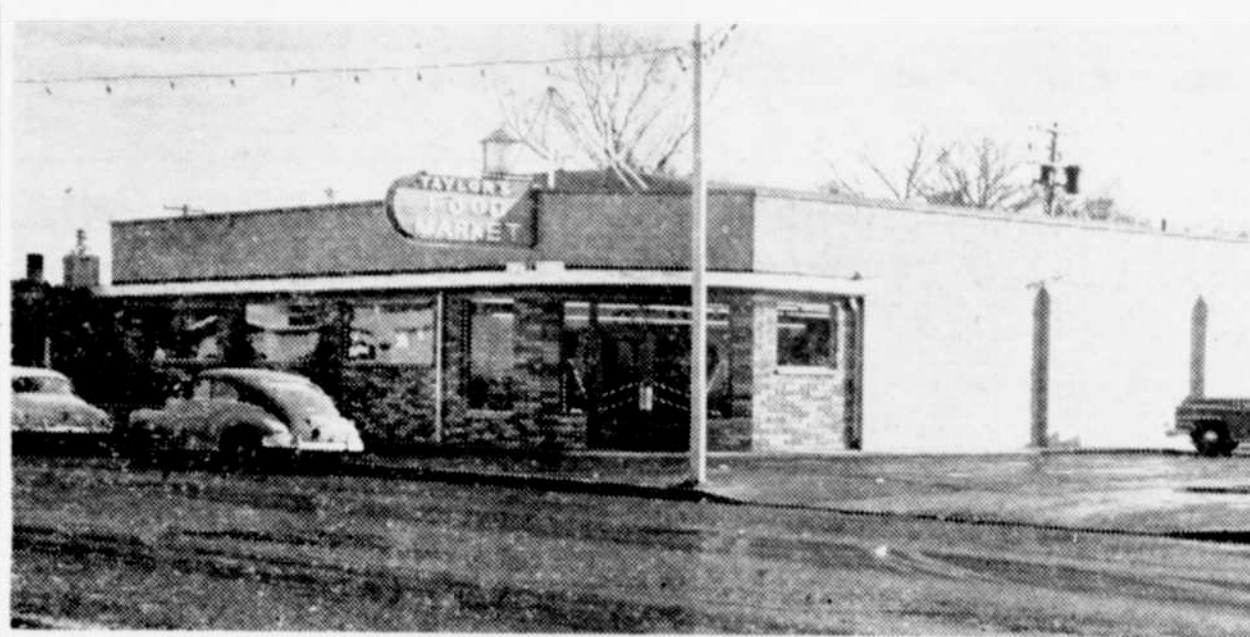
Carson explained that the 1948 act limits domestic beet sugar

producers to the marketing of 1,800,000 tons of sugar in any one year.

"We are not allowed a percentage of the total demand. The limit is a rigid ceiling which makes impossible any growth on our part. Every pound of the increase in consumption, which amounts to about 100,000 tons of sugar a year, is reserved to Cuban and other foreign producers. They are the only ones allowed to expand with the market."

The Idaho leader said that when the sugar act became a law in 1948, total annual sugar consumption in the United States was about 7,500,000 tons. In 1954, the total had risen to about 8,400,000 tons. The entire increase went to foreign producers.

"Our western development depends heavily upon our right to grow sugar beets," Carson declared. "Irrigation development, the livestock industry, the economic stability of important parts

of the country look to the sugar beet for support. Western housewives are turning more and more to beet sugar for home use, because they know it is as good as any sugar produced anywhere on earth. We want the right to supply their demands."

Carson, and other delegates to the conference, pointed out that domestic sugar producers are now allowed to supply only 55 percent of the annual domestic consumption. The other 45 percent, plus any future increases, all goes to foreign producers.

In addition to heading the Idaho growers' group, Carson is a member of the resolutions and legislative committees of the American Beet Sugar policy committee, which is spearheading the sugar beet industry's efforts for more equitable quotas.

Industry leaders from Colorado, Utah, Wyoming, Nebraska, South Dakota, Montana, Washington, and Oregon, in addition to Idaho, attended the Denver sessions.
