10 Years Ago—Dec. 21, 1944

Mrs. C. J. Gaylord, 80 year old Nyssa resident, has made 5 afghans, 35 pairs of slippers and 20 fracture pillows that were sent to the Veterans' hospital in Roseburg. She has also done similar sewing for the Red Cross. — Mrs. Ruth Larsen has taken a lease on the Nyssa Nursing home for a year from the Nyssa Lions club. — The second year home making class of the Nyssa high school has finished its Russian war relief sewing project. The girls have made 13 navy wool skirts and 21 baby nighties. — A. O. Wells of Jerome, Idaho has arrived in Nyssa to assume management of the Nyssa Theater to replace J. B. Gienzenanner who will move to Emmett to manage two theaters owned by his company.

15 Years Ago—Dec. 21, 1939

Parents of the girls taking French under Miss Palmer were treated to a serenade of French carols sung outside their doors Tuesday evening. Later they enjoyed a supper at Miss Palmer's apartment. — Harmon Horton of Weiser visited Mr. and Mrs. Murle Thomas in Arcadia. He had not been in this area since he herded sheep here in 1908 and was astonished at the change. All he remembered was sage brush. — The Nyssa Chamber of Commerce will be hosts to Eastern Oregon competitors in the State Corn Show to be held in the Nyssa high school. — James Caldwell was installed as noble grand of the IOOF lodge. 25 Years Ago—Dec. 20, 1929

The Cooks' will move into the George Brinson house which they have purchased. — Mr. and Mrs. Charles Bullard returned from Oklahoma and brought two pairs of squirrels back with them. — The bridge across Snake river east of Nyssa will be reconstructed at a cost of \$18,000.

30 Years Ago—Dec. 19, 1924

otes near Mud Springs. — Violet Pinkston, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Dudley Pinkston, fell on the ice and injured her head which required a doctor's care. — Mr. and Mrs. John Keefer of Bismark, N. D., are spending the winter here with their daughter, Mrs. Dean Smith. — The Nyssa band will furnish music during the afternoon of the big turkey catch, Dec. 24, when lots of fine birds will be liberated by members of the commercial club. — Through the courtesy of Frank Miller the Encyclopedia of Mechanical Engineering has been added to the Nyssa public library. — The Nyssa girls and boys played their first games of basketball at Vale, where both teams were defeated.

35 Years Ago—Dec. 19, 1919

Norvelle Thompson of Nyssa has been appointed by the student council of the University of Oregon to represent the Greater Oregon student committee in handling the local end of the \$30,000 campaign the students are starting to complete the unfinished Womens Building on the campus. — John Reece is now in charge of the Hotel Western, A. R. McCarty having retired from the business. — Col. Ed Davaran while enroute to Nyssa from Parma with Dr. Enos, had both of his ears frozen. — Dennis Toombs of Ironsides is visiting his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Robert Toombs over the holidays and is nursing two frozen fingers. — The hot lunches at the Nyssa school will be 30 cents per week instead of 25 cents. The extra funds will be used to hire someone to wash the dishes so that the students will no longer be obliged to do that task.

40 Years Ago—Dec. 18, 1914

T. Canham, W. S. Gibson and S. H. Ross were named as delegates from Nyssa to the Irrigation congress to be held in Portland next month. — Last Friday was horse breaking time at the John Ward ranch when a number of wild horses intended for the French cavalry were trained to the saddle by old time buckaroo's including Henry Fields and Bud Lackey. — The Ontario Argus was sold by M. E. Bain to C. A. Marsh of Wallawa, Ore. — The old Lackey house built on the Lackey homestead in 1886, is being reshingled and otherwise repaired. — A number of Nyssa and Arcadia young men have raised funds to have the ice on Arcadia lake swept and put in condition for skating. The cold weather has made the ice safe and a large crowd will take advantage of it Sunday.

A reconstruction of the life and times of Moses in fiction form is On Eagles' Wings by Arthur Southon.

Love Is A Place by Margaret Bridgman concerns the problems of everyday living for a young married couple and their children living in San Francisco and on a nearby ranch.

The Third Bullet by John Dickson Carr is a collection of mystery stories.

Rockville Man Dies Dec. 12

Jordan Valley — Funeral services were held Thursday in Caldwell for Andre Paterson Cunningham who died Sunday morning, Dec. 12, at his home in Rockville where he had made his home for the past 45 years. Interment was in the Wilder cemetery. Mr. Cunningham was born Oct. 3, 1882 in Normongill, Lanarkshire, Scotland. He served as an apprentice in the mercantile trade in Edinburgh and worked four years for the East India Rubber Co. on a tea plantation in India. He was a member of the Ceylon Rifle corporation during that time.

In 1906 he moved from India to California and lived two years in Nevada before moving to Rockville in 1909. He was married Dec. 25, 1923 at Forest Grove to Beatrice Brow, who died in August, 1935. He was married Jan. 2, 1950 at Stevenson, Wash. to Blanche Marie Jackson, who survives. He was a member of the Free Kirk church of Scotland.

Besides his wife, Mr. Cunningham is survived by a son, Andrew J. Cunningham, Jr., of Rockville; four daughters, Mrs. Cora Lee Crumican of Hillsboro, Mrs. Iloane Devine of Forest Grove, and Margaret and Helen of Rockville.
