Livestock Association Offers Plans For Disease Testing Program For Operator In County; All Voluntary

Malheur county livestock operators now have an opportunity to test their cattle for leptospirosis, anaplasmosis and brucellosis according to Tom McElroy, president of the Malheur county livestock association and chairman of the county livestock disease control committee.

All phases of the program are voluntary. An operator can test none, any, or all of his cattle for any one or all three of these diseases which cause an annual loss of many thousands of dollars to Malheur county cattlemen.

In the case of leptospirosis and anaplasmosis, the test exclusive for Malheur county, is made to accurately determine the occurrence of the two diseases in the county. There are to be no eradication measures taken. The information gained from the survey could, according to McElroy, influence the determination of a research program designed to more effectively control the disease.

The brucellosis test, being conducted on a national scale and on a voluntary basis in most counties in Oregon and in most states,

is a step toward eventual control of the disease to such a small percentage that most areas can be accredited as brucellosis free areas similar to the present tuberculosis accreditation which Malheur county now enjoys, McElroy stated.

If an operator elects to test any or all of his cattle for brucellosis, he must agree to identify the reactions with the customary mark on the jaw and sell the animals only for slaughter. The federal government will pay an indemnity on reactor animals up to \$25 or one-third the difference between the appraised value and the sale price received if an operator wants to test all his cattle and sell the reactors within a specified time. If he wants to test only a part of his cattle, he receives no indemnity payment and can sell the reacting animals for slaughter at his discretion but must keep them on his own premises until sold.

In addition to the testing program, and whether an operator wants to test any cattle or not, he can have his heifers vaccinated under this program.

which will be used at various points on the Owyhee water shed, consist of burners fed by propane gas which heat a silver iodide solution that is fed into the flame. The iodide is more soluble in an acetate solution and the flame turns the solution into gas which rises into cooler air. As the gas cools it forms into minute crystals, similar to the shape of ice crystals, which float up into clouds containing moisture.

The water vapor in clouds condenses on the silver iodide crystals and when they reach sufficient size and weight, they fall out of the cloud as snow. It was explained that if the temperature near the ground surface is above freezing, snow flakes melt and fall as rain, but if air temperature is cold enough, they fall as snow. The process takes place at from 10,000 to 18,000 feet altitude.

Any cloud that has possibility of precipitation is seeded with the solution during the period of time the agreement is in force, House said. The generators will be so placed that all clouds approaching the area can be seeded.

The state of Nevada recently signed an agreement to seed clouds in the entire Humboldt river area in northern Nevada, it was pointed out. The program in Nevada will have some fringe benefits in this area and the two projects will benefit one another, due to some overlapping of operations, although on different watersheds.

Cost of the program has been tentatively estimated at between 8 and 10 cents per acre.

Federal Income Tax Assistance
