10 Years Ago—Jan. 11, 1925

Construction of a Nyssa airport was assured by action of the city council at its regular meeting Tuesday night. The council approved the purchase of enough land with a 2600 foot runway. J. P. Lane is owner of the land. — Herschel Thompson and Grant Rinehart were appointed councilmen. Harry Miner took the oath of office as mayor. W. E. Schireman, fire chief for several years, resigned and Robert Thompson was appointed fire chief. — A new courthouse for Malheur county is recommended by the grand jury which has been held over since the September term. — The Oregon Trail and Kingman Kolony Granges went on record as approving the importation of prisoners of war for farm labor in this community. — The Nyssa Bulldogs defeated Weiser and Ontario in league tilts to ring up their 3rd victory and one defeat in the Snake river valley conference competition.

20 Years Ago—Jan. 10, 1935

Planting of spring lettuce and carrots started this week when some of the land leased by the F. H. Hogue Co., was drilled for these crops. The unusually mild winter this year has made it possible to carry on farm work every day. First to get started was Carl Seburn. — The Oregon Trail school was closed Wednesday by order of the school directors, until Jan. 14 on account of measles and chickenpox raging through the district. — The new city officials took up their duties Monday night with Don M. Graham as mayor, A. R. Millar, recorder; Art Norcott, Al Thompson, Dean Smith and Dick Tensen as councilmen. — Application has been made by the city of Nyssa for FERA labor including 4,000 hours of work on the city streets, 1,000 hours on the cemetery and 2,000 hours on the Wilson ditch.

Dilley will be succeeded by J. A. McCreight who has been transferred from Parma.
