

Wrong Artist Is Announced For Musical Concert

A mixup in press releases submitted to the Journal this week for the community concert in Ontario next Monday night resulted in publicity for the wrong artist on page 9 of this issue of the Journal.

Instead of Violinist Tossy Spivakovsky, Monday night's concert will feature Sascha Gorodnitzki, pianist, who will play at the Ontario high school auditorium, beginning at 8:15.

This artist was born in Kiev, Russia and was brought to this country before he was a year old. His great talent was discovered in his childhood and his first teacher was his mother, who was a pianist and singer. His parents refused to allow him to become a child prodigy and it was as a mature artist that he made his debut as winner of the Schubert Memorial prize.

Gorodnitzki builds his programs on the principles of balance, variety and interest. He is firmly established in the very limited front row of star pianists.

Spivakovsky, whose picture and details of his violin playing appear on page 9, will be featured at a community concert in Ontario in February.

Baked Filets Au Gratin

(Makes 6 servings)

- 1 1/2 pounds fish filets*
- 1 1/2 cups (1 large can) undiluted Carnation Evaporated Milk
- Pepper to taste
- 1 cup (1/4 pound) process-type American Cheese
- 1 tablespoon Worcestershire sauce

Roll each filet lengthwise (split lengthwise if 8" or longer). Place in shallow 2-quart casserole. Pour Carnation and seasonings over fish. Bake in moderate oven (350° F.) about 30-40 minutes or until fish flakes easily. Remove casserole from oven. Pour Carnation from casserole into saucepan. Add grated cheese to Carnation. Cook over low heat until cheese is melted, stirring until thickened (about 1 to 2 minutes). Add Worcestershire sauce. Pour sauce over baked fish. Sprinkle with paprika. Brown lightly under broiler. Serve hot. *Use fresh or frozen haddock. each or sole.
