Malheur Potato Growers Set Annual Meeting For Jan. 25 at Boulevard

Malheur potato growers will hold their annual association meeting Jan. 25 at 10:00 a.m. at Boulevard Grange hall, according to Turner Bond, association secretary.

Growers will hear a report from the economics department of Oregon State college on crop outlook for 1955, which will interpret the early planting intentions reports from other districts and storage potato stocks on hand as a barometer of probable prices next year. One early report which has been released shows California late spring intentions to be for a larger acreage than last year, which is causing concern in the industry as the possible beginning of a trend to larger plantings.

On the agenda for the business meeting of the association, Bond says, is a review of potato promotion projects that will be carried out with the local share of potato tax funds. Projects that have been carried include potato advertising, employment of a potato specialist, support of daily produce market news, and support of the construction program of labor camps in the county. Growers will decide whether these programs should be continued or expanded in line with

past results and available funds.

Directors of the association from the Nyssa and Oregon Slope districts, and one director at large, will be elected. Present directors of these districts include Harold Hart of Oregon Slope, Frank Jayo of Nyssa, and Dudley Sitton of Willow Creek, director at large. Sitton was appointed in 1954 to fill out the last year of the two-year term of Sid Flanagan when Flanagan moved to Washington.

Bond will report on the potato specialist program, covering potato trials with harvesting methods and seed control carried out last year, and making suggestions on other local production problems. Seed supplies locally and in neighboring districts will be reviewed. Pictures and cost figures of mechanical harvesting of potatoes have been gathered from neighboring districts and will be presented by Bond.

Earl Winegar of Ontario, president of the Growers' association, will preside at this year's meeting. He points out that all potato growers are members of the association, and are invited to attend. Lunch will be furnished by the association to those attending the Tuesday meeting.
