In the third stanza the Vikings doubled the Bulldogs score to take a four point lead that held right down to the wire.

Sophomore guard Larry Schenk came through for the home squad with 12 points to lead all scoring among the two teams, followed closely by Nyssa center Kenny Toombs with 11. Ed Eddy was high man for the game winners with 11 also.

Bill Lovejoy showed to be top defensive man on the rebounds as he grabbed 10 off the boards for the Nyssa team while Vale center John Wilcox got the most for the Vikings with 11.

Other Nyssa players who hit the point column were Holcomb with 8 points, Siminar with 4, and Lovejoy with 2.

Officials for the contest were Bienegana and Smith.

The Bulldogs meet the Ontario Tigers on the Tigers home court Friday night, Ontario is currently leading the SRV A-league due to last Tuesday night's game with the Weiser Wolverines who were until then, tied with the Tigers for first place. Ontario has two high scoring players in Earl Doman and Jerry Fischer, a student at Nyssa three years ago. While the Bulldogs, whose points have been pretty evenly spread out in most of their games, will depend mostly on Rod Holcomb and John Siminar for some counters.
