Former Ontario Man President Of Oregon Senate

Senator Elmo Smith

Senate President, Elmo Smith, who is presiding over the 48th State Senate, has a fundamental republican background, going back to the day of his birth. He was born in a Lincolnesque log house in western Colorado. He is the first newspaper man in modern times to head the Senate organization. He represents the largest senatorial area in the state, coming from Grant, Harney and Malheur counties—the three of them representing almost one-fourth of the land area of the state. Under the reapportionment measure his district also has the highest number, being number twenty-one. Smith will be the first senate presiding officer from eastern Oregon since Marshal Cornett, in 1947, from Klamath Falls.

Smith's chief field of influence in three previous sessions of the legislature has been in the field of highway legislation, as chairman of Roads and Highways in the senate. He aided in drawing up modern highway legislation, taxation programs and construction projects. He has very interesting antecedents in his post as chairman of Roads and Highways. Former Senator, now Secretary of the Interior, Douglas McKay, was Chairman of the Senate Roads and Highways Committee, in 1947. In 1949 the Committee was headed by then Senator, now Governor, Paul Patterson. Smith headed the Committee in 1951 and 1953.

In three sessions he has become familiar with a diversified field of legislation. In his first session he was Chairman of the Livestock Committee—has served on Game, Labor and Industries and other committees. He is intensely interested in development of water legislation designed to utilize Oregon's water resources and was a co-sponsor of a water resources board, which was activated two years ago, to recommend proper procedure.

Smith started his political career as mayor of Ontario, when he was 30 years old. On his record in this position he was given recognition by Cornet—a national magazine—as one of the five outstanding war time mayors in small American cities. He resigned as mayor in 1943 and spent several years in the U. S. Navy during World War II, winning a command commendation for outstanding leadership in time of crisis. Smith is a graduate of the

Farm Labor Group To Hear Social Security Report

Farmers who will deal with Social Security deductions and payments for the first term this year will get the lowdown on this program, as well as helping solve next year's labor problems, when the county Farm Labor Sponsoring association holds its annual meeting Friday, Jan. 28. The meeting is set for 8:00 p. m. at the Farm Bureau hall, which is the former Cairo school building, 3 miles west of Ontario.

Manning Becker, of the farm management department at Oregon State College, is scheduled to discuss farmers' responsibility for records and collections under the new social security legislation, with special emphasis on a practical means of handling needed records for transient workers and contract crews.

Other business of the association will be the selection of directors for next year, and reports on the labor program needed for the area. Tmalgamated Sugar Co., the Employment Service, and the various commodity associations will present their ideas on labor needs. A report of labor camp improvements and plans for the future, along with the finances of the association, will be reported by manager William Smiley and bookkeeper Everett Heldt.

All users of labor are invited to attend.
