(Continued from Page 1) Ferry dam in August, 1923 were \$2,121,000 and at the same time the Owyhee dam construction costs were estimated at \$6,628,000. Final costs after work was completed in 1942 were \$6,671,000. House said that the Owyhee reservoir assures a full supply of water for two years with minimum inflow the second year. With two reservoirs there would be sufficient water for four years' supply. The Duncan Ferry dam would also assure definite flood control, he reported. Another reclamation proposal to be presented to the Army Engineers is for a 100,000 acre feet capacity reservoir on Jordan creek through construction of a dam a few miles east of the Idaho line. The proposal is for supplemental water for natural flow rights on Jordan creek and the capacity would double the annual estimated requirements for purposes of a holdover storage as was contemplated in the Owyhee.

A special committee supplied information to the Bureau of Reclamation about irrigation needs and two 4-H scholarships and assistance in sending a candidate to Girls State were reported. A luncheon for a Farm Bureau-sponsored grassman tour was served by the Nyssa Chamber, which also collaborated with the Ontario Chamber at the annual Feeders Day event at the Malheur experiment station. Physical effort on the part of nearly all the membership to wrap large Nyssa-area onions, brought nationwide recognition to this community when the onions were used as place cards at the national Reclamation association meeting in Portland. Hewett stated that spontaneous response of Chamber members when the Snake river bridge collapsed, resulted in ferry service being started within a matter of a few hours after the disaster to provide access to and from Nyssa. The bridge collapse was described as a "blessing in disguise" since a modern, new structure will replace the old bridge. Optimism Voiced Gene Stunz, newly elected president for 1955, stated that the Chamber is supposed to be active in every business and activity in the community and asserted that standing committee heads have the spirit of Nyssa and many plans already have been made for the year. A chamber of commerce was compared to an automobile, all cylinders of which are important and represent various committees; the job of the president and vice president is to keep the car on the road, while the routes are selected by the board of directors. Fuel is a mixture of optimism and cooperation and optimism is assured because of prospects of a good, strong economy while cooperation is evident because of Nyssa's past record.

anti-sales tax forces sprang into action and the Oregon Farmers Union came up with a proposal that income taxes be increased for those earning more than \$7000 a year.

A proposed constitutional amendment to permit emergency clauses on tax bills was introduced. This bill would permit the legislature to pass new tax bills without giving the people a chance to kill them by referendum.

"My trip to Olympia, Wash., was very informative. Besides meeting the members of their fish and game committee and the members of the fishery commission, we met Gov. Langley and various members of the Washington legislature. We were taken first to inspect some fish ways on the Deschutes river, right in Olympia. We also went around the Hood canal some 30 miles out of Olympia to look over a salmon hatchery. At a breakfast meeting on Friday morning the inter-state problems relating to commercial

and sports fishing were discussed" Stunz reported. "Anyone interested in proposing bills should do so before Feb. 3, as I understand that bills introduced after that date will have to be presented to the rules committee. This might result in a lot of red tape and consequently the bill might never be acted upon," it was explained.

Mayor House announced that a citizens committee will be appointed within the next few days to assist the council and the engineering firm in determining the needs for partial renovation of the present system. There will be need for some new lines, some replacements and larger lines in parts of town to assure sufficient pressure in all parts of town. The committee, possibly made up of 10 citizens, will help decide the amount of a new water rental

rate, and other details to meet the approval of the general public. Meters will not be installed for residences, but some commercial users possibly may have a metered system, it was reported. The new source of supply, as tentatively planned, will serve all present needs and with an additional population of 8,000 people, Applegate said.
