**Grange Members Discuss Farm Prices, Expenses**

Discussions on current affairs and farmers' problems filled most of the program last Thursday night at the regular meeting of the Oregon Trail Grange with Frank Sherwood, master, presiding.

Members discussed crop acreage allotments and Mrs. James Stephen, Jr. told of a recent report made by the secretary of agriculture that farmers' income is up 50 percent, with Grangers questioning the accuracy of the figure. Frank Sherwood told of the U. S. Chamber of Commerce to investigate the high cost of living, involving not the farmers' profit, but middle-man income and other increasing expenses.

James Stephen, Jr., told about increased prices on all canned food and a general discussion was held on the spread of prices between dairy and beef steers. Frank Sherwood reported that he had attended a meeting where a speaker had stated that 20 percent of the taxable property in Oregon is not on the tax rolls.

Mrs. Fern Runcorn gave a brief talk contrasting conditions of 1931-32 with the present time in Oregon and stated that irrigated land had nearly doubled.

The group discussed the use of Amalgamated Sugar Co.'s brown sugar and it was revealed that homemakers were pleased with the home product.

Mrs. Garritt Stam read an article stating that cars are getting better and drivers are getting worse. The article also told of accidents resulting from drunken and fast drivers.

**CCC Loan Closing Date Is Jan. 31**

Price support loans and purchase agreements on wheat, rice, barley, oats and dry edible beans produced in 1954 must be completed not later than Jan. 31, according to the Malheur county Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation committee. The closing date applies to farmer-owned warehouse stored grain as well as to grain stored on farms.

The chairman warned farmers who expect to place wheat, rye, barley, oats or dry edible beans, under loan should file their applications in the next few days to be sure of meeting the deadline.

If the grain to be put under price support loan is farm-stored, time must be allowed for inspection of the storage structure and for a moisture test and grading of sample taken at the time of inspection.
