5 Years Ago—Feb. 9, 1950

Nyssa's heaviest fall of snow in several years, amounting to about 9 inches, was cleared from the business section without delay last week end. The Nyssa Road assessment district, with the cooperation of city removed the snow in about 48 hours with a blade, power shovel and trucks. —The new \$12,000 rural fire truck of the Rural Fire Protection district was given a thorough test of its pumps and other facilities at the Snake river bridge by H. E. Margulies of the engineering department of the Oregon insurance rating bureau. — City and state police officers were still seeking clues into the burglary of the Farmers Supply Coop., which lost \$1799.26 in a Sunday night break-in. — More than \$1300 was collected in the polio drive which ended in this community this week, according to Mrs. Henry Hartley, chairman.

In the novel, The Plum Thick-et, by Janice Holt Giles a woman relives a golden summer of her childhood and its violent climax.

Mary Ellen Chase writes of her own years between the ages of nine and twelve in the White Gate, which she calls "adventures in the imagination of a child."

Annie Oakley of the Wild West by Walter Havighurst tells the life story of a phenomenal marks-woman who missed only four performances with Buffalo Bill's famous Wild West Show.

The life of Charles Thurber who knew the last of the old whaling men and loved the sea but became a Methodist preacher, is told by Ethel Blaisdell in the book And God Caught An Eel.

Bride of the MacHugh by Jan Gox Speas is a romance of the seventeenth-century in which a young woman from London, arrived in Scotland for a visit
