SCS Schedules Annual Meeting At Vale Feb. 23

L. P. Chastain, chairman of the board of supervisors, Malheur Soil Conservation district announced that the second annual meeting of district cooperators will be held in Vale Wednesday, Feb. 23.

Chastain reported that a varied program has been arranged, including entertainment at the Rex Theatre starting at 10:00 a. m. The meeting which starts at 11:30 a. m. is built around the importance of grass in the agricultural economy of Malheur county and will feature the following speakers: A. W. Sawyer, superintendent of the Squaw Butte experiment station, Milton Branch, rancher of Midvale, Ida., and John L. Schwendiman, plant materials specialist, Pullman, Wash., nursery, Soil Conservation service.

Branch was selected as north-west grassman of the year on the basis of his successful range and pasture management program, Lloyd Gift, Bonanza, Oregon, member of the State Soil Conservation committee and Forrest Scroggin, area director, National association of Soil Conservation districts of Union, will appear on the program also.

Ray Duncan, a member of the board of supervisors will review the report on the accomplishments of the district during the past year and he will tell of the objectives for 1955.

An election will be conducted at the meeting for the purpose of selecting a district supervisor for a three year term representing the Ironside-Brogan areas within the Malheur Soil Conservation district. Nominations will be accepted from the floor before the balloting begins.

The program will conclude with a conservation film "Grass—The Elko Way" which was filmed in the Elko, Nev., Soil Conservation district and depicts the successful cooperative efforts to produce more range and pasture grass. The film was narrated by James Stewart, noted movie star.

Chastain said that he will serve as chairman for the meeting. Dan Townley, a member of the Board of Supervisors and a personal friend of Branch will make the introduction.

Chastain said that the Vale Lions club and other Vale merchants are cooperating with the supervisors in planning and carrying out this conversation day program by providing the entertainment and the noon lunch. Free lunch tickets will be distributed by Vale merchants. Lady Lions and District Supervisors wives are assisting in the preparation and serving the lunch. The lunch will be served at the Vale Community hall at 12:00 noon.
