

Beet Growers Act To Halt Change In Sugar Act

Protests have been made by the Nyssa-Nampa Beet Growers association about passage of a U. S. senate bill and a house bill man act regarding freight charges on sugar, according to Jed Lewis, manager of the Amalgamated Sugar Co.

The association has sent letters to Oregon and Idaho senators and congressmen protesting passage of the bills. The Patman act, which would be repealed if the bills passed, permits any shipper to absorb freight charges on products going to populous centers in order to be competitive on the market, it was explained.

William M. Carson, president of the association, stated in a letter protesting the bills, "We believe that we should have the right to sell our sugar in distant markets at whatever price is necessary to meet competition in good faith, and that in such markets, we should be permitted to meet any reduction in price offered by our competitors."

The letter went on to express fear that the senate bill, if enacted, might be so construed as to condemn the only methods of marketing sugar which will permit the continued production in

Oregon Legislature Studies 699 Bills

This bill would create a deadline for filing a candidate's complete nominating petitions and the various other papers pertaining thereto. In the original bill this deadline was interpreted to mean that these papers had to be in the Secretary of State's office by the deadline date. This, I feel, does not give the candidates living in the more remote parts of the state an even break with those living nearer to Salem.

"A bill has been passed which would exempt the one-cow dairy from state milk grading inspection. This has yet to be signed by the governor. A hearing held Wednesday aimed at the elimination of grades B and C milk, attracted a large group of dairymen. The producers claimed that the bill, if passed, would drive the small dairymen out of business. Mrs. Charley Grider of Nyssa, and Fred Burgess of Vale were heard at the hearing.

Also, the State Educational Department has been authorized to obtain federal funds for the public schooling of Klamath Indians.

"Some new ideas have been advanced on the compulsory meat inspection bill. It is thought that the expense would be cut if certain meat plant employees were licensed by the state for lay inspection duties under the supervision of traveling veterinary inspectors. The meat plant license fees bring in some \$80,000 to the state and if the above idea was put into law it is thought that perhaps the slaughterers would agree to a substantial increase.

"The emergency tax clause was protested at a hearing Thursday by farm and labor leaders. They voiced the fear that the clause would lead to a state sales tax.

"Oregon's legislature convened in a joint session Friday to commemorate the 146th birthday of Abraham Lincoln. A musical program was enjoyed and also a speech by D. O. Wilson Meredith, president of the U. of Oregon.

"Chairman of the agriculture committee, Rep. Herman Chingren, has a flower pot on his desk in which a 6-inch sprout of corn is growing. He declares that when that corn is 4 feet tall the legislature will be over and we can all go home.

"I understand that in various parts of the state, various organizations, meet as often as twice a week, while the legislation is in session, to discuss bills that are of particular interest to their group. Howard Fujii of the Oregon Slope district, who is legislative chairman of the Malheur county Farm Bureau, is doing a remarkable job of keeping me informed as to their opinions of different bills. I get this information from Howard in plenty of time to allow me to go over the bills thoroughly and to contact Howard again if necessary. If more leaders of organized groups, would make a practice of bringing up the discussion of bills before their members it would be of great benefit to the people of the county as well as to their representative.

"A copy of all bills are on file at the following places: County Court House, at Vale, H. F. Logue, Ontario Chamber of Commerce Secretary, Moore Hotel, Ontario; Ontario-Argus Observer, Ontario; Malheur Enterprise, Vale, and Harold Henigson, Nyssa.

Malheur Cattle Free of TB in Tests Given

Last year 3,186 cattle were tested for tuberculosis in 136 Malheur county herds, but not a single reactor to this disease was found. In 1953, six reactors were found in 12,983 cattle tested for T. B. in this county.

Statewide in Oregon, only 80 reactors were found in the 208,732 cattle tested under the program in 1954. While this percentage (0.038 percent) is extremely low, it nevertheless shows why Oregon continues annual tuberculosis testing under cooperative agreement with the federal government.

Malheur county is one of 26 counties which had no reactors last year. And it is one of 32 counties now under a T. B. modified and accredited status. The present three-year accreditation rating for this county is good until Feb. 1, 1956.

This information comes from Dr. A. G. Beagle, Portland, in charge of the federal veterinarians in Oregon, and M. E. Knickerbocker, Salem, chief of the division of animal industry of the state department of agriculture. The two agencies direct the joint federal-state testing program.
