To Raise Funds
By Civic Women**

"Heart Sunday" will be observed in Nyssa Sunday as a climax to the annual drive to collect contributions for the Heart Fund. A corps of women has been organized to canvass all districts of the city. Dr. and Mrs. K. A. Danford are co-chairman of the Nyssa campaign, assisted by a committee from the Nyssa Civic club composed of Mrs. Jay Bunn, chairman; Mrs. Don Graham, Mrs. J. E. Brower and Mrs. Dwight Mason.

Diseases of the heart and blood vessels were the leading causes of death in Malheur County during 1953. Of the 136 deaths recorded in the county, 69 were from heart or circulatory diseases, or over 50 percent of the total, according to statistics released by Henry Andreas, 1955 Oregon heart fund chairman.

Committee members working on the Heart drive in Nyssa area met Friday afternoon at the home of Mrs. Don Graham to make final plans for the campaign. The city was mapped out into districts and women from all parts of town were enlisted to cover their immediate vicinities. Mrs. Danford will canvass the business district Saturday prior to Heart Sunday.

Kits with envelopes for individual donations will be given all patrons and a receipt will be given in return for each donation, Mrs. Danford stated.

Another phase of the program will be the acceptance of any contribution in memory of or in thanks for work being done for heart disease sufferers. Mrs. Danford announced that a donation of \$10 had been received from Anna Marie Coch from the Hoot Nanny Ranch in Murphy, Ida., in memory of her father, J. H. Shepard of Ontario, who died Jan. 4.

Each day this week, the Nyssa Pharmacy has been selling homemade cake and coffee with the proceeds donated to the Heart Fund.
