From the Journal Files

5 Years Ago—Feb. 23, 1950

Based on mountain snow cover as of Feb. 1 and on the assumption that February and March precipitation will be normal, the stream-flow forecast for the Owyhee river above Owyhee dam indicates an estimated run-off of 325,000 acre feet for the period, March to July, according to figures released by the bureau of reclamation. — Mr. and Mrs. H. M. Herren sold the Sweet Shop to George Reid of Scotts Bluff, Nebr. — Mr. and Mrs. L. E. Newgen and Harold Powell were overcome by gas from a coal heating stove at the Newgen home when the pipe was removed from the stove while laying a new floor. The men opened the windows and summoned neighbors. The three recovered satisfactorily. — Nyssa firemen made their first run in the new Rural Fire Protection fire truck, at the home of Mr. and Mrs. Ray Weatherspoon 2½ miles northwest of Nyssa. They saved most of the household goods but were unable to save the 4-room dwelling. — The postoffice department is setting up routes in anticipation of carrier service in Nyssa March 1. Postmaster Lloyd Lewis announced.

10 Years Ago—Feb. 22, 1945

Bob Newgen of Sunset Valley lost his tractor by fire while he was cleaning weeds on the Mitchell avenue road. Weeds became tightly caught under the tractor and were set on fire by the exhaust, it was impossible to free the machine as it had "high-centered." — Mr. and Mrs. George Sallee are moving back to Nyssa from Payette where they sold their grocery store. Mr. Sallee will be associated with his brother, A. C. Sallee, in the Food Mart. — The Amalgamated Sugar company announced a change in the agricultural management of the firm. George Daly will assume management of the farming operations in the Nyssa-Nampa district, and Henry Zobell, fieldman in the Parma-Wilder district, will succeed Mr. Daly as agricultural manager here. — Lightning struck in the Owyhee area, burning out a small distribution transformer at the schoolhouse and blowing 25 individual transformer fuses. It also burned

out a big distribution transformer in the sub-station on North Third in Nyssa. Bernard Frost, Idaho Power manager reported.

15 Years Ago—Feb. 22, 1940

The Idaho Power company has built 13 miles of power lines to 36 customers since the first of the year according to Bernard Frost, local manager. — Bob Parke, assistant athletic coach at the Nyssa high school has announced he will tender his resignation. He has hopes of a school in California. — The congregation of the Sunset Valley Community church is now holding services at the CCC camp, and has been given an acre by O. Fyllingness and Ed Corfield. A parsonage is to be started this week and at its completion a church edifice of Owyhee red rock will be erected. — Two dwellings, one for H. H. Miner and one for Albert D. Watson are among the building permits issued this week by Recorder M. F. Solomon, total \$4700. — Rev. Floyd White of Union was called to Nyssa this week to preside at the funeral services of the late John Reece. — Jack Fischer of Nyssa was on the committee to form a Malheur county farm marketing cooperative, sponsored by the Malheur County Farm Bureau.

20 Years Ago—Feb. 21, 1935

Attorney Carl Coad is moving to Nyssa and will be associated in the practice of law with Lott Brown. — Construction crews are arriving to start work on the Owyhee project after the winter lay-off. — Work started this week on the Wilson ditch, using FERA labor. A crew of 18 men went to work under the foremanship of Bert Hoxie. The city streets will be the next job tackled. — Golf fans will grab their shovel and rake and head for the golf course Sunday, for cleanup day. — The Commercial club is sponsoring a show in the Liberty Theatre, entitled "Casey's Trial." — Raymond Cartwright of Big Bend was injured when he was kicked in the face by a horse. — Bill Keizer, Ralph McNitt, Oswald Forbes and Oca Short, left for Bonneville dam to work on the steel gang. — Wm. Smith and family of Scotts Bluff, Nebr., arrived to make their home on the Ray Cantrell place which they have purchased.

25 Years Ago—Feb. 21, 1930

In the Oregon Trail community, moving seems to be the order of the day. The Lem Wilson family moved to the Van Dyke place, John Timmerman to the Bend and Glenn Holmes to the place he purchased from the Gem State Lbr. Co. — Headlines in the Journal "Ontario is not closest Town by a Damsite" The Oregonian reported Ontario as being the town nearest the Owyhee project.
