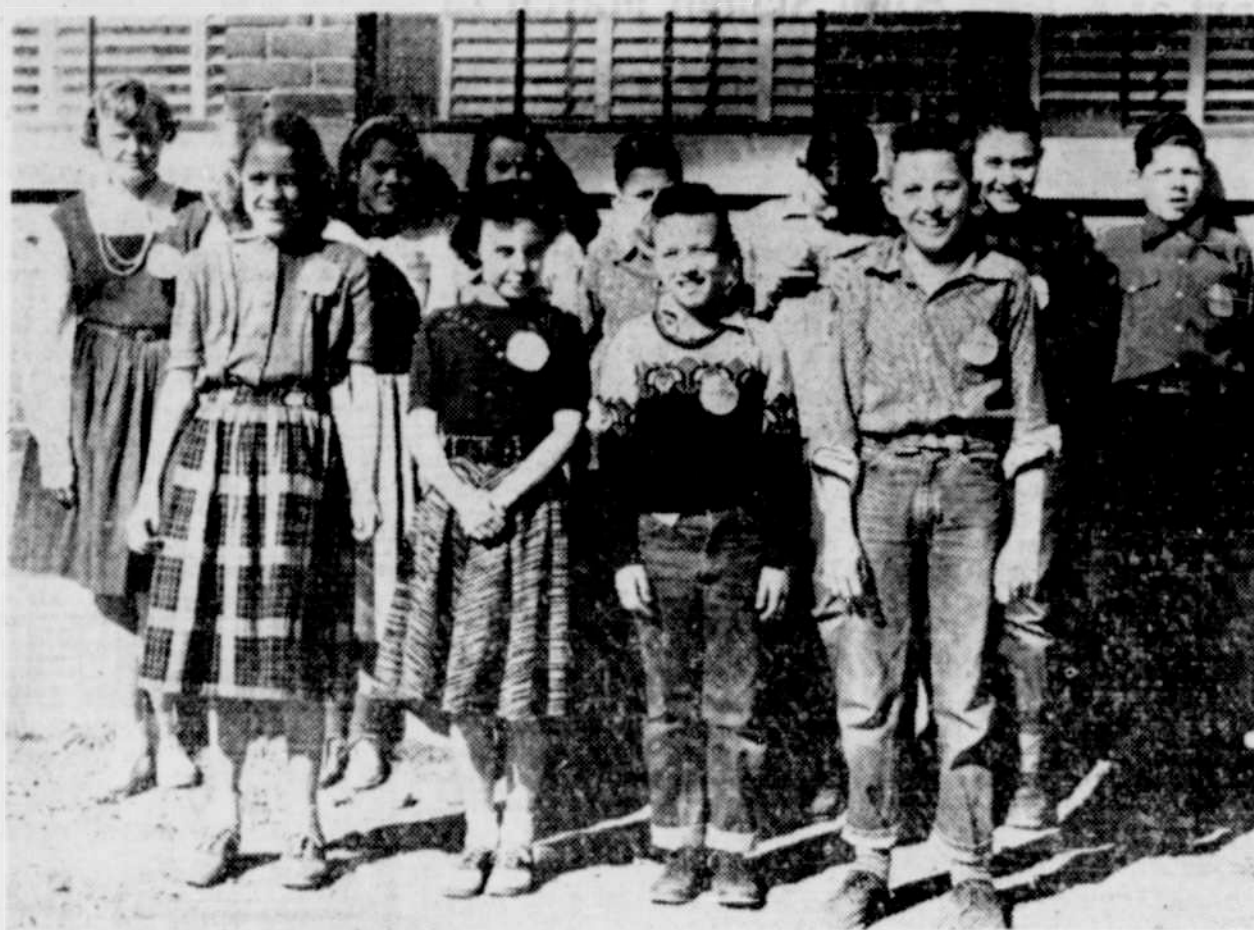


Nyssa Sixth Grade Student Patrol Members Honored At School Party

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State Representative Expresses Belief That 'Everybody Will Dig' For Taxes

"I have an idea that we are all going to have to have to dig into our pockets to help solve our deficit which now stands at \$55,000,000," Rep. Emil Stunz reported from Salem this week. He went on to comment that the proposed tax program calls for a surtax on the income tax, reducing the \$600 personal income tax exemption to \$500, doubling the 1 percent withholding tax, enacting a tobacco tax, taxing utility income and boosting taxes on insurance premiums.

"By next week I may be able to tell you just how much each of the increases will be," he said.

Stunz commented that nine weeks of the legislative session has now passed and action has been completed on 137 bills. There have been 886 bills introduced and 31 bills and two memorials were given final legislative approval this past week.

The following is a summary of bills discussed by the representative in his report last week:

HB 125, relating to the movement of farm machinery, has been passed out of the Highway Committee, and will be up for the third reading and passage on the House floor this week.

HB 171, relating to the breeding of dairy cattle has been passed by the Senate.

HB 99, the meat inspection bill will be the subject of a public hearing March 16.

HB 52, the potato bill, passed the House Friday.

I plan to introduce HB 392 which relates to the Nyssa Road Assessment district, in the house Tuesday morning.

There has been no action on HB 25 to set up a water resources board to regulate well water.

A bill to fix milk prices on a producer level in now ready for introduction in the house.

The physical education bill would let the school boards and not the legislature decide what health and P. E. classes to have in the schools.

The senate has defeated a bill to have new convention for the purpose of writing a new constitution. This was against the wishes of Gov. Patterson.

HB 276, the pioneer fish bill, was much discussed before passing in the house, Friday. The main question was, "How old, and who is a pioneer?" Rep. Klemsen found this definition of a pioneer in his desk dictionary. "A pioneer is an early settler." Under the present law anyone who has been an Oregon resident for over 60 years can obtain a pioneer's license for 50 cents.

Under the proposed change, such a license could not be issued to anyone who was born after 1899. Approximately 7000, of these 50 cent license were issued in 1954, and the number is increasing annually. Unless some controlling legislation is passed, this could, in time, work a hardship on the game commission in a financial way.

Friday, John McKean, director of game Dept. and Bill Brown, district supervisor of La Grande, members of the game commission from the Baker and Wallawa area, met with the house fish and game committee to discuss the problem resulting from the starving hundreds of deer in the Wallawa mountains. These men reported that in recent years, during severe winters, deer and elk had been fed by the game commission and that more of them had died from this feeding than would have died otherwise. It is very difficult to successfully change the diet of an animal that is in a weakened condition from starvation. The idea of having more special hunts to decrease the number of deer in this area is being considered.

I received a phone call from E. E. Cloninger, chairman of the Nyssa chapter of the Isaac Walton League, relative to obtaining financial help from the State Fish and Game department, to help pay for the safety devices, etc. on the Owyhee reservoir boat ramps. I contacted Phil Schieder, chairman of the Fish & Game Department, and he stated that he and one other member of the department plan to inspect the installation at the dam the later part of this month.

Labor has failed to win its requested 35 percent increase in state industrial benefit accidents, but the house did pass a bill for an increase of about 22 percent. It sent to the senate three labor bills but later recalled one of them for correction.

The onion bill will be out of legislative counsel within the next few days.

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
