Eileen Farrell, soprano, will be heard in the Ontario high school auditorium Saturday March 19 at 8:15 in the final event of the Community Concert association's 1954-55 season.

Miss Farrell is now universally acknowledged as possessing one of the greatest voices that America has ever produced. Although her name had long been famous because of her many important appearances on radio and her own program "Eileen Farrell Presents," it was in the 1950-51 season that Miss Farrell came into her own as a great dramatic soprano at her New York debut before a packed house in Carnegie Hall. She also sang that same season a record total of 61 solo performances in 5 separate engagements with the New York

Philharmonic symphony. Always a conductor's favorite, her services with symphony orchestras are always in demand, and she has appeared with 10 to 20 of the nation's leading symphonic organizations every year.

Born in Williamstown, Conn., a daughter of Irish parents who were billed in the vaudeville circuits as "The Singing O'Farrells", Eileen grew up in an ardently musical home. That the family environment fostered the love of singing is evident in every Eileen Farrell performance.

Despite a strenuous concert schedule, she manages to spend a good measure of time with her family, her husband and two small children at their home on Staten Island, New York.

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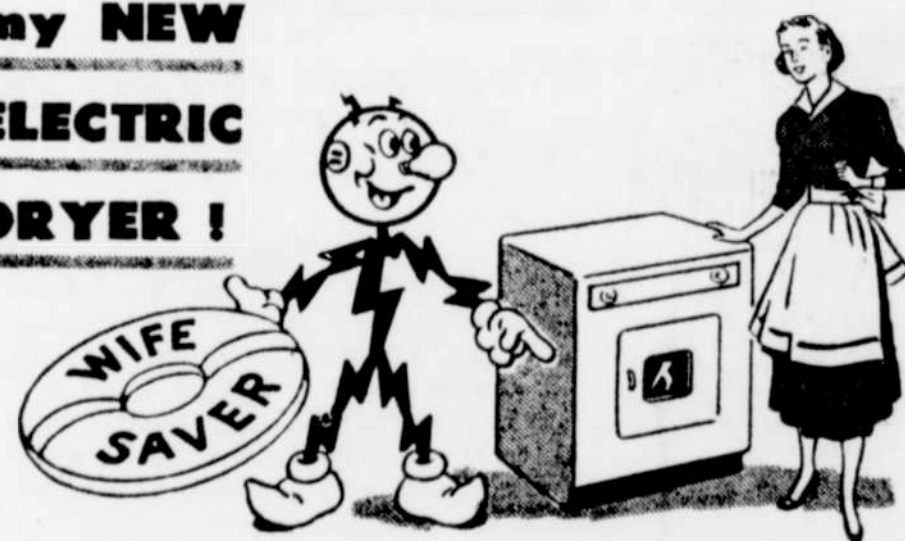
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
