Dr. Gale McKee On Knife, Fork Program Sat.

Members of the Knife and Fork club will have an opportunity to hear a brilliant address when Dr. Gale W. McKee, historian, lecturer and radio commentator will analyze the foreign policy of the United States Saturday evening at the East Side cafe in Ontario.

With his rich background of history, Dr. McKee will give a penetrating down-to-earth appraisal of America's international policy which will restore faith in these critical times. His interpretation is invigorating and thought provoking.

Born in Nebraska, the educator received his degrees from Nebraska State Teachers College, the University of Colorado and the University of Chicago. For nine years he has been a university professor including service at Nebraska Wesleyan, Iowa State College, the University of Notre Dame and at present, he is Assistant Professor of history at the University of Wyoming.

Recognized as an outstanding speaker, Dr. McKee is especially popular with audiences of the Rocky Mountain Empire because of his analytical and practical middle-western approach to his subject.

His book "The Founding Fathers and Entangling Alliances" will soon be ready for publication.

A special committee, composed of Russell Gressley, Loyd Adams, and O. E. Cheldelin reported at Thursday night Oregon Trail Grange meeting that they had met with the North Board of Control regarding information and reports about the irrigation project operations. Paul House, manager of the North Board, told the committee he would attend any meeting to explain any subjects for the water users.

It was decided that an open meeting will be arranged for April 21 at 8:30 p. m. with House as the speaker. Pot luck refreshments will be served.

George Cleaver, agricultural chairman, told of attending an ASC meeting in Ontario and plans for quarterly meetings for all agricultural committee members of Granges. He reported that changes have been made in various practices.

Loyd Adams reported that several farmers have been successful in killing gophers by pouring lye in gopher holes. Alva Goodell told about the county turning the property used for the experiment station over to the state. Included in the agreement is a clause to revert the property to the county if the experiment farm is ever abandoned.

George Cleaver reported on a new blood disease said to be affecting more than 50 percent of the cattle in the county. A serum from Australia is available, but it hasn't been used. Ticks and flies are said to be carriers, Cleaver reported.

The group held a general discussion on the proposed sales tax. O. E. Cheldelin gave a report on Grange insurance and the Grange voted to give a 4-H club scholarship.

We don't know why people come into our lot and kick the tires of the cars they're looking at. We never have been able to figure it out.

The tires on the used cars at our used car lot can tell you a lot about the quality automobiles that pass through our hands. And you don't have to do any kicking.

Tires that are worn in spots, or that are worn only on one side of the tread and not on the other, are signs of front wheels out of alignment. Evenly-worn tires are one of those clues, like the lack of a white coat on your tongue, that means general good health inside.

Tires that are free from cuts and bruises give a good indication of the kind of owner that had the car before you. A driver inclined to run into the curb leaves his mark on his tires.
