Days Gone By in Nyssa Community

From the Journal Files

5 Years Ago—March 23, 1950

The Nyssa school district has employed 6 additional teachers for the coming year. The new teachers are grade school, Jean Tidwell, first grade; Mildred Hite, second grade; Marie Rawlings, third grade; Joyce Goodman, fourth grade; David Mortimore, English teacher and Guy Poorman, English and social science. — A quantity of seashells found by Bill Bolitho of the reclamation bureau in Cow Hollow, show that this area was at one time under water. Mitchell Butte was formed by sedimentary deposits that flow into the so-called Payette Lake. That was before Snake river broke through the Seven Devils mountains, according to amateur geologists. — Mr. and Mrs. Lloyd Tobler returned from a trip to Cuba and Puerto Rico. Mr. Tobler won the trip through increased sales of the Purina company at the Tobler Feed and Fuel firm during 1949. — Mrs. Don Lytle and daughter, Nancy returned from a 6-months visit with her parents in France.

10 Years Ago—March 22, 1945

A program and banquet was held by the American Legion and auxiliary honoring the 26th birthday of the organization. — Merle Kygar of Nyssa was released as a Japanese prisoner from Bilalid prison in the Philippines and has arrived in San Francisco. — Miss Vera Jensen, registered nurse, has enlisted in the army nurse corps. — Wm. J. Beus, who recently moved here from Burley, has been appointed as superintendent of Sunday schools of the Weiser stake of the LDS church. — Mr. and Mrs. Grover Lytle, who own a farm on Eureka avenue and who have been teaching at a Japanese camp at Tule Lake for the past six months have returned to their farm. — More than 300 members signed up in the Malheur Game League. A meeting will be held at the Boulevard Grange hall to adopt a constitution and to elect officers and directors.

15 Years Ago—March 21, 1940

The Nyssa Civic club re-elected Mrs. Andrew Boersma as president. Other officers were Mrs. Bernard Frost, vice president; Mrs. Carlos Buchner, secretary and Mrs. Grant Rinehart treasurer. — The Nyssa FFA chapter during the past week dug some

450 holes in preparation for the planting of trees and shrubs in the Nyssa city park. The work was under the supervision of Robert Sawyer, club advisor. — The house on the Hub Walters place in Newell Heights, an old land mark built 40 years ago, was being torn down. Tom Russell now owns the farm and is building a house for his renters. — The ladies rest room at the Nyssa city hall has now been furnished and ready for use. The decorations and furnishings were one of the activities of the Civic club and were under the direction of Mrs. Frank Morgan. — J. W. Bushong, principal of the Nyssa high school, handed his resignation to the school board. He has accepted the principalship at Bend.

20 Years Ago—March 21, 1935

A barn, chopped hay, cutter and four calves were destroyed by fire when the barn on the Brady Fowler place occupied by Harry Shelton burned. — E. L. Palmer and family of Idaho Falls arrived to make their home here. — In a wild session Tuesday night, the Idaho senate passed the 2 percent sales tax. The house had previously passed the bill. — Mrs. C. W. De Boer and son are opening a new meat market in the Tensen building. — Baling crews are extremely busy at the present time baling hay for shipment to Minnesota with 55 cars being billed out of the Nyssa station since the first of March. — Dewey Ray is driving a new Dodge and Les Ernest is sporting a new Ford. — D. H. Curran is clearing his land on the bench west of Nyssa of sage brush to be ready for water next year. — Dr. Sarazin, Sue Keizer and Isabel Sarazin were at the Morrison-Knudsen camp vaccinating the men with anti spotted fever serum.

25 Years Ago—March 21, 1930

Gov. Norblad was the guest of the Nyssa chamber of commerce and in company with the members of his party and a delegation of Owyhee district officials and townspeople, visited the Owyhee damsite where the highest dam in the world is being built. Malheur Station Feeders' Day Is Slated April 13

Sixty beef animals, on feeding and grading trials for the past five months, will go on display April 13 at the Malheur experiment station Feeders' day to help livestock men compare dollar returns of various grades under normal feeding conditions.

Neil Hoffman, Malheur experiment station superintendent in charge of the trials, says the program will start at noon at the station feed lots five miles south and west of Ontario on the Vale highway. The public is invited.

John Landers, Oregon State college livestock specialist, and George Bain, Malheur county extension agent, assisted in the trials conducted jointly by the OSC agricultural experiment station and extension service.

The 60 animals representing five grades of feeders have been fed identical rations of alfalfa hay and ground ear corn and barley since Nov. 18 to measure net returns of each grade above original purchase price and feed costs.

Cost of the animals last fall ranged from \$18.50 a hundred-weight for choice feeders down to \$10 a hundred for inferior grade. Other grades were good, medium and common. Each of the five lots has since been weighed and graded every 28 days by a packer-buyer to determine when they could have been sold for highest net return.

Landers says some animals that will now grade "prime" could have been sold earlier as "high good" or "low choice" for higher profits. He and Hoffman will discuss the experiment and distribute printed reports on costs and expected returns for each lot.

Local buyers will place an estimated killing value on the animals prior to the Feeders' day with final results to be announced following early May sales. In addition, one carcass from each lot will be shown with grades by federal graders, and Al Oliver OSC animal husbandman, will discuss the carcasses.

Forms For Parents to Okay Salk Polio Vaccine Being Distributed in Schools Today; First, Second Graders Eligible

Detailed plans now are being worked out for the possible administration of polio vaccine to 1227 Malheur county children who will be eligible to receive it if it is licensed, Dr. L. A. Maulding, county health officer announced.

As was announced Feb. 21 by state health officials, all first and second grade pupils in public, private and parochial schools in the state are included in the planned program, he explained. It also will be available to others through physicians at the same time.

Parents were warned by Dr. Maulding not to jump to the conclusion that the current planning indicated the vaccine already had proved effective.

"The vaccine which will be furnished by the National Foundation for Infantile Paralysis is the same vaccine that was given 440,000 children last spring," he said. "We do not know yet whether it really prevents paralytic polio. Until April, when we will learn the results of the evaluation study now being conducted at the University of Michigan, we cannot know if the vaccine is effective."

"But we cannot wait until then for planning the protection of as many of our children as possible. Vaccinating large numbers of children is a big and important job, entailing many procedural tasks that can't be performed over night."

"If the license is granted in April, we must be ready to start vaccinating at once, so that, if possible, we can finish before our schools close and the polio season starts. We want to give the vaccine early so that many

children can be protected before polio appears in their communities.

"This program would not be another test but the first use of a newly established preventive measure."

Under the direction of the State Health department, Dr. Maulding has been conferring with school authorities and physicians who have pledged their full cooperation.

The polio vaccine will be furnished from a supply being purchased by the National Foundation with March of Dimes funds. It will be made available by the National Foundation without health officers for use in the charge for the product to state above groups, if licensed by the federal government.

The National Foundation has financed the development and production of the Salk vaccine. Contracts were made with manufacturers for a supply of vaccine costing \$9,000,000 in March of Dimes funds. This enabled manufacturers to keep their production facilities in operation during the waiting period and be ready to go into full production as soon as the vaccine is licensed.

"Vaccine would be given by the health department this spring only to those eligible children whose parents sign forms requesting it," Dr. Maulding added. "It is a completely voluntary program. The forms will be distributed through the schools beginning March 24. We should like to know as soon as possible how many eligible children we must provide for, if the vaccination program is carried out. If the vaccine is not licensed, there will be no program."

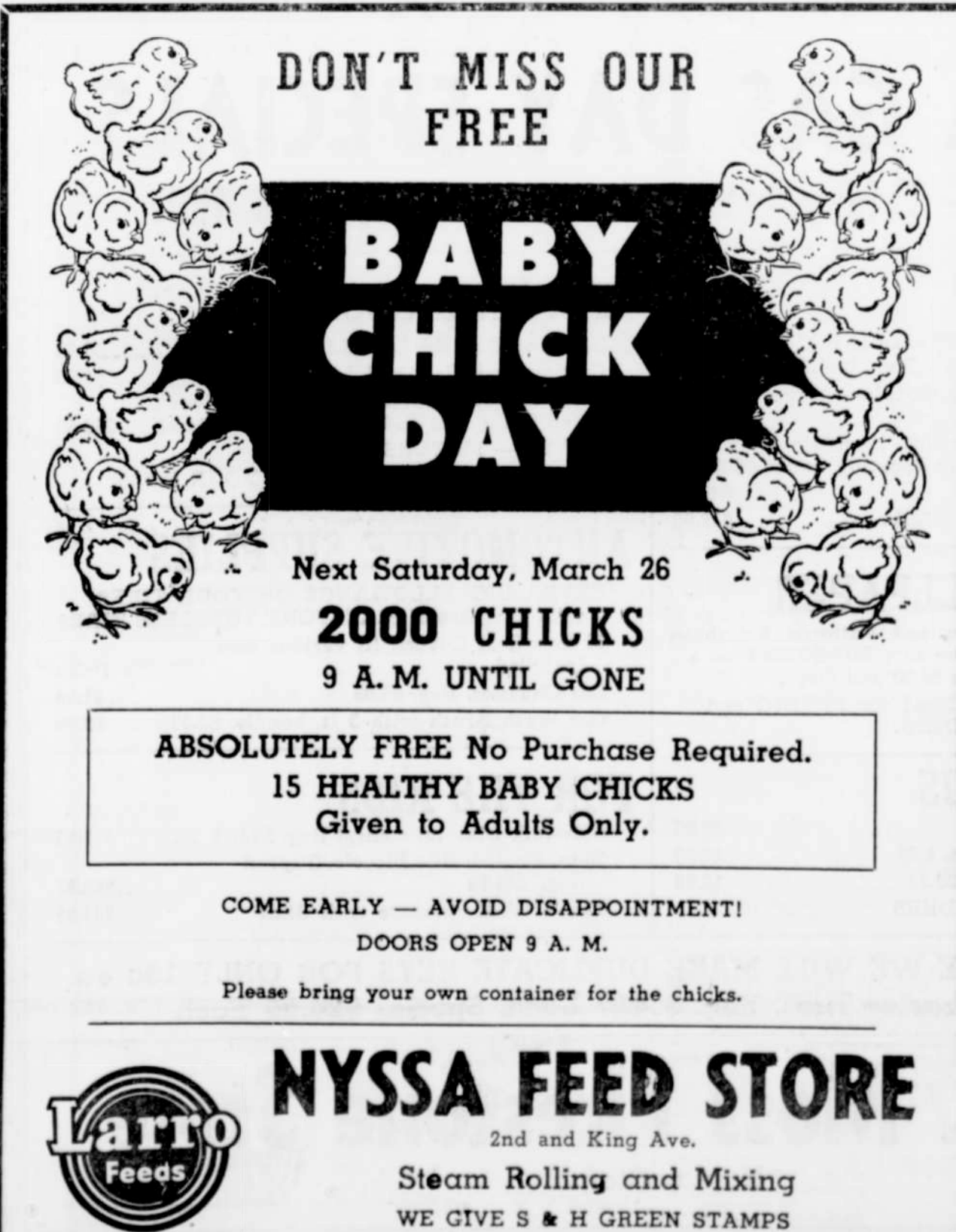
