

Film Depicting Life of Wesley Slated Sunday

The new motion picture "John Wesley" is coming to Nyssa.

It will be shown twice at the Community Methodist church on next Sunday, April 3rd, at 5:00 and 7:45 p.m., according to the pastor, Rev. Vernon L. Taylor.

The feature-length film is in the new Eastman color and was produced by the Radio and Film Commission of the Methodist church in cooperation with J. Arthur Rank.

It brings to the screen for the first time the dynamic and colorful 18th century evangelist and educator.

John Wesley's miraculous rescue from a burning house at the age of five, at the beginning of the film, forecasts the dramatic and eventful life which unfolds in this story of a man of slight stature but of impelling influence upon his contemporaries and upon history.

The English clergyman thought his venture in America as a missionary to the Indians in the Georgia colony was a failure, but it was the kind of failure which opened the door to the discovery of a religious certainty he had been seeking.

Furthermore, this discovery, in which John Wesley felt his "heart strangely warmed," led him to face mobs unafraid, and to ride 250,000 miles on horseback, changing the masses of English people from a low state of moral degradation to sturdy and happy uprightness.

His "enthusiasm" was frowned upon by the lethargic leaders of the Church of England of that day, but it was this new-found enthusiasm which enabled him to influence so many phases of the life of English-speaking peoples.

His appeal to the common man, his establishment of schools, clinics, lay preaching and societies—finally his sending of supervisors for the movement in the new world after the American Revolution—all these make the film one which will be long remembered.

The Rev. Taylor explained that while the film is being released only to Methodist churches during the initial period, the public is invited to see the picture at the Methodist church.

Flood Control Study Reported Favorable

A flood control study of the Malheur river and its tributaries was reported favorably this week by a subcommittee of the House public works committee according to a report from Rep. Sam Coon.

The Army engineers study, costing about \$70,000, has been urged for some time by Malheur county residents to prevent flood damage and erosion, Coon said. A representative of the Engineers declared at the committee hearing that the study could be incorporated into a survey of the upper Snake river that is now under way, without additional appropriations.

Flood protection in the area is needed, Coon said, on the lower 14 miles of the Malheur river, the lower 24 miles of Willow creek, and the lower 12 miles of Bully creek. Malheur river joins the Snake near Ontario in a wide, irrigated valley, parts of which are subject to flooding from both streams.

According to news received from the American Jersey Cattle Club, Columbus, Ohio a registered Jersey cow, Queen Victory Rose owned by Fred E. Burgess, Route 2, Vale has been rated a tested dam for having three offspring with official production records.

Amelia's Sayda Poet Choice, a registered Jersey bull, also owned by Mr. and Mrs. Burgess is announced by the club as having qualified as a tested sire. This animal was officially classified for type and given a rating of very good.

The herd of registered Jerseys owned by Lewis Johnson, Vale was classified for breed type by an official classifier of the American Jersey Cattle Club, Prof. H. P. Ewalt of Oregon State College. The Johnson herd has an average score of 85.52 on 43 animals while the breed's average is 83.

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Ontario Man Dies In Wreck Thurs.

Raymond Aizo Hashitani, 37, of Rt. 2, Ontario died in a traffic accident last Thursday evening on highway 30, 10½ miles north of Ontario.

According to Oregon state police, the automobile that Mr. Hashitani was driving south on the highway veered to the opposite lane of traffic and struck the rear of a pickup truck that was driven by George Madden of Weiser.

The Hashitani car then traveled about 168 feet and collided head-on with a semi-truck and trailer driven by Eugene Prestwich of Orem, Utah, according to police. A passenger of the truck was Wallace Prestwich, also of Orem and a brother of the driver. Officers said that neither Madden or the brothers were hurt.

Drivers of the trucks involved in the accident told police that Hashitani was slumped to one side in the car, prior to the collision.

Survivors include his wife, Mrs. Fay Hashitani, two children, two brothers, Roy and George Hashitani of Ontario and a sister, Mrs. Alice Nishitani of Nyssa.

Funeral services were held Monday in the First Baptist church in Ontario. The Rev. Junichi Fujimori officiated and interment was in Evergreen under the direction of Beecher's chapel.
