## Seniors Pace Inter-Class Meet

The annual NHS inter-class track meet got underway last week with the senior class running away from all other opponents to build a comfortable lead.

The events which have been run off to date are the 100 yard dash with senior, Ronald Buchner breaking the tape in 11.5. Ronald Cooper gave the seniors another win when he out classed the field in the pole vault and cleared the bar at an even 10 feet. In another field event, the broad jump, Ronald Forbes who has been plagued with an injured foot during basketball season, took first place with a leap of 17 feet, 6 inches to capture another senior win.

Buchner continued his winning ways, when he took the lead in the 440 yard run and was never headed and registered a time of 57.7 with the ailing Forbes second. Ronald Pruynt, third, and Kenny Toomb fourth to give the seniors all four places.

## Boys Win Awards In Science Fair

Ronald Forbes and Iven Lowry Flake were successful participants in the physics section of the Science Fair held in Nampa last Friday. The Marshall Science society of the Northwest Nazarene college in Nampa invited all interested high school science students to enter their projects for exhibition. Several high schools in the valley participated. Ronald Forbes won first place on his six cylinder solenoid motor and received a rating of excellent on his model peltin water wheel and magneto which generated electric power.

Iven Flake won second place on his electric locomotive and railroad system which he and his brother, Lowry had built.

These three exhibits were entered in the physics division of the fair and were judged by Vaughn Anderson, chemical engineer of the state of Idaho Health department. The Nyssa science students earned a total of 300 points which gave Nyssa second place.

The competitive exhibition was won by Nampa high school with a total of 400 points.

Several students attended the evening award assembly and science films. They were accompanied by Charles Steffens, Nyssa high school science instructor.

Ronald Forbes and the Flake brothers plan to enter their exhibits in the Third annual Northwest science exhibition to be held at Oregon State college in Corvallis, May 1 through May 6.
